He's Chucked!

Only 32% of New York state voters have a favorable view of Senate Minority Leader Chuck Schumer (D-NY) - his lowest approval rating in 21 years of surveys conducted by Siena College.

A whopping 55% of respondents in the new Siena poll said they had an unfavorable view of the Senate Democratic leader.

Schumer's rising unpopularity comes as ascendant left-wing Democrats have called on the longtime New York lawmaker to step down as Senate leader amid fury over not winning concessions from President Trump and Republicans to end the record-breaking government shutdown.

Schumer was viewed negatively by virtually every demographic group — liberals and moderates as well as conservatives, voters of all ages, from all regions of the state and both sexes.

His support was split among registered Democrats — 45% to 43%. The lone bright spot for Schu-

mer was among black voters, with 59% viewing him favorably compared to 22% who didn't.

But 63% of white voters and 58% of Hispanics gave him a thumbs

Jewish voters were also meh on Schumer, with 46% of the faith viewing the proudly Jewish senator favorably and 47% unfavorably.

Schumer, 74, has been a force in New York politics for five dec-

He's held public office since the 1970s — first as a state assemblyman, then as a Brooklyn congressman before being elected to the US Senate in 1998.

That makes his plummeting stock all the more stunning.

"In February 2005 — the first Siena Poll in its current incarnation - Schumer had a 63%-20% favorability rating.


"In July 2005, he had his all-time best favorability rating, 70%-22%," said Siena College pollster Steven Greenberg.

"Schumer is viewed unfavorably by a plurality of New York City voters, and strong majorities of downstate suburbanites and upstaters," Greenberg said.

The survey also noted that lefty

democratic socialist firebrand and "Squad" member Rep. Alexandria Ocasio-Cortez (D-NY) is more popular than Schumer.

Some allies are urging AOC to challenge Schumer in a Democratic primary if he decides to seek re-election in 2028.

"It's worth noting that Rep. Alexandria Ocasio-Cortez has an overall 42-37% favorability rating.

"But it's 62%-20% with Democrats and 55%-27% with city voters," Greenberg said.

By comparison, only 38% of Big Apple voters have a favorable view of Schumer, while 48% have a sour view.

AOC's primary concern

Progressive stalwart Rep. Alexandra Ocasio-Cortez is pouring cold water on a lefty New York City lawmaker's attempt to unseat House Minority Leader Hakeem Jeffries.

The far-left "Squad" member originally said she was "not aware" of Councilman Chi Ossé's recently filed primary bid, a new Democratic Socialists of America member challenging Jeffries for the Brooklyn House seat.

"But I certainly don't think a primary challenge to the leader is a good idea right now," she then added to reporters Monday, according to Fox News.

Ocasio-Cortez echoed Mayorelect Zohran Mamdani's reluctance to endorse a fellow lefty in a primary challenge against Jeffries. Matthew Fischetti

"The Babe Comes Home—Smiling" the front page of The New York Evening Post declared above a photo of Babe Ruth crossing the plate, and being congratulated by Lou Gehrig, after hitting the first home run of

World Series in Game 3.

Ruth's two-run homer off

Pittsburgh's Carmen Hill in Game 4 broke a 1-1 tie and sent the Yankees to a sweep, justifying the star-packed team's menacing nickname: Murderers' Row.

It was the second of the Yankees' now-record 27 world titles, and the first of three championships won by the Ruth-Gehrig tandem. "In this series the Yanks are getting great pitching, good hitting and fine fielding," wrote Frederick G. Lieb. "When all departments are functioning on the Yankees the aggregation is unbeata-- Dave Blezow

Wicked: For Good' resumes bewitching tale

WICKED: FOR GOOD

Running time: 137 minutes. PG (some suggestive material, action and violence). In theaters Nov. 21.



■HUS ends the longest intermission ever.

A whole year after El-phaba belted "Defying Gravity" midair and the credits of "Wicked" rolled, the witch is back in "Wicked: For Good," an emotional and elongated version of the Broadway musical's second act.

Theater-lover common wisdom has it that the first half of composer Stephen Schwartz's "Wizard of Oz" riff, based on Gregory Maguire's novel, is infinitely better than what comes after the bathroom break.

Onstage that's true. All its best ballads ("The Wizard and I") numbers company ("Dancing Through Life") are frontloaded. It's a bright poppy boardingschool story about a misunderstood cultural icon that ends with power.

Darker and grimmer Act 2, though, by a hair, makes a meatier movie because characters aren't as silly and they actually propelling toward a satisfying conclusion.

"Wicked was mostly fun: Dylan's Candy Bar with singing. "For Good" is all

> trying to inform oppressed Ozians that their vaunted wizard is a fraud and that of Glinda (Ariana Grande) as a popular-if-conflicted government official tasked with raising morale with

glittery propaganda, is far more compelling than "We weren't friends, and then we were!"

There's a sole beam of lightness through the storm clouds.

That belongs to Jeff Goldblum's Wizard, who croons an old-fashioned showbiz song called "Wonderful," playfully telling idealist Elphaba, "You've got to give the people what they want." **OZ-FEST:** "Wicked: For Good" wraps up the adapted adventures of feuding witches played by Ariana Grande (far left) and Cynthia Erivo.

> Plenty of L. Frank Baum's magical creations make their awaited entrances.

The Wicked Witch of the East, Cowardly Lion, Tin Man, Scarecrow and Dorothy all shuffle in. And, like the Tin Man, the film finds a beating heart. The love triangle between Elphaba, Glinda and Fivero (Jonathan Bailey) hits harder than it tends to do on Broadway thanks to Bailey's fervor and genuine concern.

Erivo, who has an easier handle on the Wicked Witch of the West's serious side than her cackle, is giving the best movie-musical vocal turn since Jennifer Hudson in "Dreamgirls."

Mixing strong, to-the-rafters singing with intimate, subtle scene work isn't easy. Thank goodness Erivo can do it.

And she continues to have a wonderful rapport with the delightful Grande, who digs deeper as Glinda's engagement is on the rocks and she questions the meaning of her life.

Why, oh, why?

Beefing up Grande's role is one of the forgivable ripples of tacking on so much padding to the "Wicked" films, which total nearly five hours.

What should have never happened, however, is allowing no-good-deed Schwartz to transparently compete for an Oscar by ramming in two atrocious new songs: "There's No Place Like Home," for Erivo, which just makes you wish you were listening to "Home" from "The Wiz" instead. "Girl in the Bubble," a soft, existential-crisis ditty that would be forgettable were it not for its moronic lyrics. "It's time for her bubble to pop," sang Glinda as my ears handed in their two weeks' notice. Once we arrive

at the sweet climactic friendship duet "For Good," though, those indulgences are forgiven. Director Jon M. Chu shoots it with tender simplicity and lets the pair connect and feel. He wisely shows much more restraint in Part Two. There was a symphony of sniffles in my theater, and not because of cold-and-flu season.

Zohran 'backs' pol tied to group

Mayor-elect Zohran Mamdani is reportedly supporting an Assembly candidate who is linked to the Council on American-Islamic Relations and once described 9/11 as a terrorist attack that a "couple of people did."

Mamdani's backing of Aber Kawas (below), a longtime Palestinian-American activist, was relayed by a member of his mayoral transition team during a closed-door Democratic Socialists of America meeting in Manhattan last week, according to a Daily News report.
"[Mamdani] told me that

while he has tremendous re-



spect for everyone in this race, he has said that he will support Aber in whatever she

pur-

sues," top political adviser to the Mamdani transition Sam McCann said during the meeting, according to the News.

Neither McCann nor a Mamdani spokesperson returned requests for comment Tuesday.

Kawas, an organizer in the city's Arab and Muslim communities since 2010, is trying to garner support from the NYC DSA for her run in the 34th Assembly District in Queens.

Outgoing Assemblywoman Jessica González-Rojas has endorsed a primary bid by her chief of staff, Brian Romero.

Kawas has been listed among speakers for CAIR, a Muslim charity accused of Hamas links.

She also has a history of incendiary comments, which resurfaced on X following reports of Mamdani's support.

In one unearthed clip, posted by X user Drew Pavlou, Kawas says of 9/11, "The idea we have to apologize for a terror attack that a couple of people did and then there is no apology or reparations for genocides ... I find reprehensible."

PROTESTERS Given checks from Muslim nonprofit for 1G

Anti-Israel agitators who spread disruption at American colleges and were punished by authorities were awarded checks for \$1,000 by a Muslim nonprofit, The Post has learned.

The money was given to students who faced penalties for leading pro-Palestinian protests before and after the Hamas attack on Israel on Oct. 7 2023, according to a bombshell report by the Network Contagion Research Institute and the Intelligent Advocacy Network.

It was awarded from a Champions of Justice Fund fund, set up by the California chapter of the Council on American-Islamic Relations as "institutional endorsement," the report claims.

CAIR California's affiliates in San Francisco and Los Angeles

raised more than \$100,000 in donations for campus radicals, while the main solicited \$64,000 in donations, records show.

The money then offered as interest-free loans in grants of \$1,000 to students who lost "scholarships, housing or other support because of their advocacy," according to CAIR's website.

In October 2024, CAIR-California awarded \$20,000 in loans and scholarships to 20 student protestors from the Champions of Justice

The identities of the student recipients were not revealed, but the institutions they attend were in CAIR's literature, including Columbia University, the University of Pennsylvania and Harvard.

That means students suspended or expelled from Columbia for storming and occupying the uni-

versity's Hamilton Hall, barricading themselves inside the building with furniture and padlocks on April 30, 2024 — an incident that resulted in the building being stormed by police — could have potentially qualified for the \$1,000 checks.

"These programs support students after acts of criminality and violence, creating a reward structure for building the most militant face of the movement. This is how ideologies metastasize," NCRI founder Joel Finkelstein warned to The Post.

'Swift and severe'

One testimonial published by CAIR in literature about their fund read: "The consequences of my pro-Palestine advocacy have been swift and severe. As a safety marshal at a protest against the bomb-



ing of the Al-Shifa hospital, I was doxxed by Zionist students, leading to my information being spread to the far-right media.

"I have endured relentless death threats, lost my summer law firm offer and its accompanying diversity scholarship. This ordeal has set me back at least \$115,000 in lost income and legal fees, an overwhelming burden for my working class family."

Although the quote is anonymous, the details match those of Ibrahim Bharmal.

He was arrested on Oct. 18 at Harvard Business School campus after participating in a "die in," the night after Gaza's Al-Shifa hospital was bombed. At the time he was volunteering as a safety marshal.

He also told The Boston Globe he lost his summer placement at a prominent law firm as a result of the altercation.

Bharmal, 29, was later sentenced to 80 hours of community service and to complete an anger-management program for an assault of a Jewish student during the campus

Focus on Harvard

Bharmal never received any punishment from Harvard for his conduct. In fact, a year after his arrest he was even awarded a \$65,000 fellowship by Harvard Law Review, a publication he had contributed to, for graduates who plan to go into the public sector.

Bharmal graduated from Harvard in 2025 and now works at CAIR-Los Angeles as an immigration-rights legal fellow. He did not respond to The Post's request for comment about how much money he had received from CAIR.

CAIR leaders backed many of the anti-Israel encampments. On the second day of a student encampment at University of California, Riverside in the spring of 2024, Hussam Avloush, executive director of the Greater Los Angeles

Area office of CAIR led a teach-in and gave a talk to the anti-Israel protesters, according a report.

CAIR says it is the largest Muslim charity in the US, receiving hundreds of thousands in donations from progressive nonprofits, including Tides Foundation and the California-based Weingart Foundation.

It claims that less than 1% of its funding comes from outside of the US. However, when an ex-employee, Lori Saroya, filed a lawsuit against CAIR for defamation, which asked for details on who their foreign sources of funding were, and a judge ruled they had to disclose them, the charity abruptly settled the case out of court.

The charity had previously been awarded \$500,000 from Saudi Prince Alwaleed ibn Talal, according to a 2002 report in Arabnews.com

Separately, CAIR-California is under probe by the Department of Justice, according to IAN, and the California Fair Political Practices Commission over alleged financial misrepresentation of federal funds.

In one instance, the charity took \$7.2 million in taxpayer cash intended to

settle impoverished immigrants in California between 2022 and 2024.

The cash, which was intended to assist 1,800 Afghan refugees, only helped 177 Afghan refugees from 2021 to 2023, only 10% percent of the total it was meant to serve.

Follow the money

Much of the money could not be accounted for within CAIR's official filings, reviewed by The Post.

NCRI and IAN told The Post they are demanding a forensic audit of CAIR-California, which received more than \$17 million in donations from individuals and businesses as well as the government in 2023, according to their latest publicly available filings.

A lawyer representing CAIR-California denied there has been any misuse of funds.

"The false claims alleged are part of a larger defamation campaign targeting Muslim Americans by fringe anti-Muslim groups," said Amr Shabaik, the legal director of CAIR-California.

Abbott: CAIR a 'terror org'

Texas Gov. Greg Abbott formally labeled the Council on American-Islamic Relations, one the nation's largest Muslim civil rights groups, a foreign terrorist organization.

In his Tuesday declaration, Abbott vowed to go after the Washington-based group, accusing it of having direct ties to Hamas and vowing to have the state attorney general "sue to shut them down" in Texas.

Abbott's declaration also included the Muslim Brotherhood, a transnational Sunni Islamist group founded in Egypt with offshoots linked to past violent attacks.

"The Muslim Brotherhood and CAIR have long made their goals clear: to forcibly impose Sharia law and establish Islam's 'mastership of the world,' "Abbott claimed. "These radical extremists are not welcome in our state and are now prohibited from acquiring any real property interest in

Texas."

There is no evidence that either CAIR or the

Muslim Brotherhood is seeking to impose Shariah law in America.

Neither group is listed as a terrorist group by the federal government, with the Muslim Brotherhood disavowing any previous violence linked to the group, which now provides hospitals and schools in the Arab world, according to the Council on Foreign Relations.

CAIR, which has operated in the US for about 30 years, has long denied any association with Hamas or other terrorist cells, with the civil rights group slamming Abbott's declaration as "defamatory and lawless."

"We are not and will not be intimidated by smear campaigns launched by Israel First politicians by Greg Abbott," the group's Texas branch said in a statement.

"We plan to continue exercising our constitutional rights, defending civil rights, and speaking truth to power, whether in defense of free speech, religious freedom and racial equality here in Texas or in defense of human rights abroad."

In 2024, ACC and CAIR proudly launched the **Champions of Justice Fund**, dedicated to supporting students who were targeted for their advocacy of Palestine on college campuses. In October 2024, this fund awarded \$1,000 educational grants to 20 deserving students. As the fund continues to grow, we aim to expand our support to stand up for justice.

This Manhattan neighborhood might be losing its bohemian bona fides — one eight-figure sale at a

The Upper West Side has racked up two sky-high sales in recent weeks, one of which broke a neighborhood record, all thanks to a massive luxury development.

The sales reflect a prominent

shift in the uptown enclave. Once the domain of rent-controlled apartment blocks filled with writers and artists, the historic neighborhood is attracting an everwealthier set.

Extell Development Company changed the Upper West Side's skyline when it constructed 50 W. 66th Street. If the name Extell sounds familiar, that's because it's the developer behind Central Park Tower and One57 on Billionaires' Row.

On Monday, according to records filed with the city Department of Finance, a 50 W. 66th St. unit traded hands for a cool

\$44.93 million.

The 42nd-floor sponsor unit spans 7,000 square feet, the Real Deal reported, with five bedrooms and seven baths. Lisa K. Lippman of Brown Harris Stevens represented the buyer, whose identity is shielded behind Pipedream 66

That deal came on the heels of a 47th floor apartment selling in late October for a whopping \$46.77 million, according to city records, which marked the Upper West Side's priciest-ever home sale.

Selling like hotcakes

Despite the 127-unit building lacking a dedicated website or much advertising — the tower is enjoying a popular streak. A source familiar with the building to The Post that it's more than 75%

Corcoran agent Kirsten Jordan, an Upper West Side local, told The Post that New Yorkers with generational wealth are buying

into the area. Wealthy buyers are recognizing the area for its proximity to two of Manhattan's best parks and easy access to the West Side Highway.

"There's a lot of people moving uptown from downtown who need space and are willing to be on the West Side," Jordan said, noting the area offers better value per square foot and more available product than the East Side of Central Park.

An influx in development in recent years coincided with an influx in new, attractive retail offerings as far up at the West 80s, Jordan said, with boutique shops and gluten-free bagel spots catering to wealthy newcomers.

"It has really gone through a transformation over the last five years," Jordan said.

Plans for a second, taller tower from Extell Development Company are already underway on the former site of ABC Studios. Slated for 77 W. 66th St., the luxury turbo-tower is planned to top out at

MTA boss Janno Lieber didn't seem to remember how much a monthly MetroCard costs Tuesday as he claimed commuters are "loving the benefit" of the potentially more expensive tap-to-ride system.

The decades-old Metro-Card system will officially vanish by year's end, to be fully replaced by the pay-asyou-go OMNY system.

"You don't have to have \$100 bucks in your pocket to pay for a monthly," the transit agency's CEO said on WNYC's "The Brian Lehrer Show" — even though a month of unlimited rides actually costs \$132.

OMNY is flexible but caps weekly charges at \$34 which could total \$1,768 for a year — or nearly \$200 more than a current unlimited pass costs.

"People are loving those benefits," Lieber bragged about the new program, which was riddled with software bugs at launch.

LI mom's life-saving move for tot, 4

A terrified Long Island mom's quick-thinking choice helped save the life of her toddler son over the summer - and eventually revealed the exceptionally rare condition he suffers from.

"Picture breathing through a milkshake straw, then breathing through a

regular straw, then trying to breathe through a coffee straw," Maria Carlin, 36, recently told The Post of her 4-year-old Jack's harrowing experience in late July.

Carlin, a nurse at North Shore University Hospital, got her stricken son — previously undiagnosed — into

the car and began driving to the medical facility after he spent the night crying in agony without "a single symptom of anything."

Jack suddenly lost all of his air halfway into the 10minute drive.

Carlin decided to continue to the ER, knowing immediate resuscitation wouldn't be enough, given Jack would need rapid intubation among other urgent procedures.

Further examinations showed he had a laryngeal cleft, which impacts between 10,000 and 20,000 annual births, according to

Northwell.

Jack is now a happy, healthy pre-K-enrolled kid who, along with his mom, dad and siblings Luke and Emma, makes up a family incredibly grateful to the frontline workers who brought about their happy Alex Mitchell ending.

Gov. Hochul is reportedly teaming up with Wall Street executives in an effort to talk President Trump out of sending National Guard troops to New York City in the wake of socialist Mayorelect Zohran Mamdani's victory this month.

A top aide to Hochul has reached out to leaders of the Big Apple's finance industry in hopes of convincing the Trump administration to refrain from deploying federal troops to the city - arguing that doing so would harm the economy, according to The Wall Street Journal.

Jackie Bray, Hochul's director of homeland security and emergency services, is spearheading the effort and has reportedly met one-on-one with top New York executives to get their buy-in.

According to the Journal, Bray shared data with executives showing that National Guard troop deployments would harm local businesses and tourism.

Hochul's team has yet to ask business leaders to convey the concerns to Trump since there is no immediate threat of a federal takeover, the publication reported.

sending the National Guard to the city, Trump has reportedly weighed funding cuts in response to Mam-Ariel Zilber

NY prison closure

Another New York prison is set to shut down, The Post first reported Tuesday, as Gov. Hochul's administration continues to grapple with a staffing crisis at state

The state Department of Corrections and Community Supervision confirmed it would close Bare Hill Correctional Facility in Franklin County and part of the Collins Correctional Facility in Erie County, forcing almost 300 workers to move to another premise.

The move, approved in May, allows Hochul to close up to three prisons. Two were shut before Christmas Vaughn Golden last year.

Kat plan Famed twins, 89, in assisted suicides

The Kessler twins, a German singing and dancing duo popular in the '50s and '60s, have died by joint assisted suicide - saying they couldn't bear if one sister died before the other.

Alice and Ellen Kessler died at age 89 at their home in Grünwald, near Munich, on Monday.

The sisters "no longer wanted to live" and "they had chosen to end their lives together," as reported by the German newspaper Bild.

Alice and Ellen were assisted by the German Society for Humane Dying, an advocacy group that provides people with access to lawyers, doctors and other tools.

"The decisive factor is likely to have been the desire to die together on a specific date," group spokesperson Wega Wetzel told CNN.

"Their desire to die was wellconsidered, long-standing and free from any psychiatric crisis,' she added.

In an interview last year with Italy's Corriere della Sera, the sisters said their wish was "to leave together, on the same day . . . The idea that one of the two will go first is very difficult to bear."

Leg-endary duo

Assisted dying was made legal in Germany after it was ruled in 2020 that an individual has the right to end their life and to seek help from a third party as long as the decision is made freely without outside pressure.

"They had been considering this option for some time. They had been members of the organization for over a year," the group said in a statement to NBC News. "A lawyer and a doctor conducted pre-

liminary discussions with them."
In April 2024, Alice and Ellen told Bild that they wanted their ashes to be buried in the same urn, alongside their mother, Elsa, and dog Yello.

The siblings were born in Nazi Germany, and their family fled East Germany for West Germany in 1952. After taking ballet from a young age, they launched into international fame as they performed at the Lido in Paris, a hot spot for cabaret performances.

They also appeared on the Italian variety show "Studio Uno," represented Germany at the 1959 Eurovision Song Contest and made history by being the first female stars to show their legs on-screen.

Over the years, they appeared on popular variety shows such as "The Ed Sullivan Show" and "The Dean Martin Show." They also were close to Frank Sinatra, Fred Astaire, Elvis Presley and Rock Hudson during their time performing.

Radio Monte Carlo shared a touching tribute to Alice and Ellen following their deaths.

"Alice and Ellen Kessler left together, just as they lived: inseparable," the Instagram statement read. "Born in 1936, they were an absolute symbol of European spectacle, including music, dance and television. In Italy, they became celebrities as the 'legs of the nation,' icon of elegance and stage presence since the Fifties."



Bid to halt hosp takeover D4vd 'eyed' in teen death

Trustees of the financially struggling Maimonides Hospital, located in heavily Orthodox Jewish south Brooklyn, filed a lawsuit early this week to stop a government takeover of the 80-year-old medical facility.

Maimonides' leadership plans to merge with the city's public hospital system — Health + Hospitals — converting the private, independent hospital into a city-run facility overseen by a board and president/ CEO appointed by the mayor.

As part of the merger, Maimonides would receive a desperately needed \$2.2 billion over five years through a state grant, according to a spokesperson for the cash-strapped hospital.

But trustees of the medical center and nearby Borough Park residents, particularly Jewish locals, fear the level of care at a public Maimonides named after 12th-century Rabbi Moshe Ben Maimon, an advocate for medical training — would drastically decline. Carl Campanile

D4vd is reportedly being eyed as a suspect in the death of teen Celeste Rivas Hernandez, whose severely decomposed body was discovered two months ago in the back of the rapper's Tesla.

Police are probing Hernandez's death as a possible homicide, sources told TMZ, though the medical

Don rolls out red carpet for MBS

WASHINGTON — In a display of pageantry fit for a king, President Trump welcomed Saudi Arabia's Crown Prince Mohammed bin Salman to the White House with full-dress military honors and a dramatic flyover of military to celebrate a \$1 trillion partnership.

The Saudi leader was greeted on the South Lawn by an Army mounted honor guard and black horses bearing American and Saudi flags, with six warplanes conducting a flyover of the White House for a touch of military drama as bin Salman reached Trump's side.

The pomp and circumstance came despite the event not being an official state visit, as bin Salman serves as the prime minister of Saudi Arabia — not the head of state. That role belongs to his father, King Salman bin Abdulaziz Al Saud, though bin Salman is considered the country's de facto

Trump praised the prince, saying they've been "really good friends."

Inside, the president and crown prince were chummy before reporters in the Oval Office during the visit, with Trump poking fun at bin Salman's infamous fist bump with former President Joe Biden in 2022 — joking that he is not afraid to touch the Saudi leader as he grabbed his hand.

"Trump doesn't give a fist bump," Trump said after shaking the crown prince's hand in the Oval Office. "I don't give a hell where that hand has been, I grab that hand."



The centerpiece of the visit: Saudi Arabia pledged to increase its US investments from \$600 billion to almost \$1 trillion - with investments across the US economy and a focus on sectors including artificial intelligence and rare earth materials.

"Today and tomorrow, we are going to announce that we are going to increase that, that \$600 billion to almost \$1 trillion of investment, real investment and real opportunity in many areas," bin Salman said.

President Trump on Tuesday called for ABC News to lose its license after one of its reporters peppered him with Oval Office auestions — including whether his family's business dealings with Saudi Arabia constituted a conflict of interest.

ABC's Mary Bruce used Trump's meeting with the Crown Prince Mohammed bin Salman to also ask about the killing of Washington Post journalist Jamal Khashoggi.

"People are wise to your hoax," Trump said. "Your crappy company is one of the perpetrators.

"I think the license should be taken away from ABC because your news is so fake and is so wrong."

Ultimately, he answered the question, explaining that he

was not involved with the Trump Organization any longer to make overseas business decisions.

"I have nothing to do with the family business," Trump

Bruce's question about business ties came intertwined with a more explosive one: US intelligence's conclusion that Crown Prince Mohammed bin Salman approved the 2018 killing of Khashoggi.

In defending the crown prince, Trump said: "You're mentioning somebody that was extremely controversial ... A lot of people didn't like that gentleman.

"Things happen, but he knew nothing about it. And would you leave it at that?" he added. "You don't have to embarrass our guest by asking a question."

Wall Street," Trump said. "And what it really means for everybody, what really counts is jobs. A lot of jobs. We have a lot of jobs."

Trump further noted that the investment was a reflection of the state of the US economy under his leadership.

Manse too rich for aide's salary: feds

Former top state aide Linda Sun lived large in a Long Island mansion with a Ferrari parked in the garage and Birkin handbags in her closet — all thanks to her alleged secret gig as a Chinese foreign agent, a court heard this week.

Sun, who served under Gov. Hochul and her predecessor Andrew Cuomo — with a salary that never exceeded \$145,000 per year during a decade-plus stint in Albany — could only afford the luxuries by cashing in on her lofty position to advance China's agenda, federal prosecutors allege.
Photos of the spoils

from the purportedly crooked plot made public on Tuesday were shown to jurors in Brooklyn federal court during Sun's ongoing corruption trial.

The jury got a glimpse of the loot, including a snazzy brown Hermès Birkin bag seized from Sun's walk-in closet in the \$3.6 million Manhasset manse, and a Patek Philippe watch with a receipt showing it was bought by Sun's husband and now co-defendant, Chris Hu.

Federal agents testified Monday about recovering the gaudy goods, which included a 2024 Ferrari Roma and 2022 Mercedes GLB SUV, plus \$130,000 in cash from a Queens safe deposit box.

There was a golf simula-tor," FBI Special Agent Edward Tam said of what the feds found inside the basement of the couple's home, according Courthouse News.

Mom takes stand

The US Attorney's Office for the Eastern District of New York claims the cash and goods were all tied to the pair's alleged scheme, pointing to Sun's salary and the modest income that Hu reported from his lobster export business.

Prosecutors revealed in court that the FBI also seized a 2018 letter sent to Sun from the Chinese consulate office in New York, which read in part, "Your personal friendship and kind support will always be cherished."

The feds separately searched Sun's parents' home in Flushing, where according to trial testimony they discovered her dad wearing a silver Rolex, Courthouse News reported.

Sun's mother, Mei Ping Sun, took the stand begrudgingly Tuesday after receiving an immunity deal from the feds — plus a subpoena ordering her to testify — and told jurors that her ex-husband was sporting the flashy timepiece despite not being able to afford his own apartment.

At the time of the 2024 raid, she was still living with her ex after their divorce during the COV-ID-19 pandemic "because he has no money to rent a place," Mei Ping said.

She also provided jurors with details about a Signature Bank account that her daughter and Hu had opened in her name, and which she testified she had no involvement with.

Under questioning from Hu's defense lawyer Nicole Boeckmann, Mei Ping gripped the microphone tightly as she claimed through a Mandarin interpreter that the account was to be used to buy a house for her.

But she admitted that she mentioned nothing about the house when questioned by the FBI and that the home was never purchased because "I didn't like it."

Sun is accused of abusing her position as a deputy chief of staff in the executive chamber under Hochul and director of Asian-American affairs under Cuomo to do favors for Chinese officials, like swaying the governors not to meet with officials from Taiwan, which Beijing does not recognize as a sovereign nation.

Sun's alleged handlers showered her family with gifts like salted duck prepared in the style of Nanjing, her mother's hometown and steered millions of dollars to Hu's business, the feds claim.

Sun and Hu have pleaded not guilty to charges of bribery, fraud and money laundering, while Sun has denied a charge of failing to register as a foreign agent of

The trial is expected to last until mid-December.

Ex-Eric liaison escapes

A disgraced former aide to Mayor Adams cried Tuesday as he dodged prison time after defrauding taxpayers in a straw-donor campaign scheme.

"I'm feeling content and just so happy it's over," said Mohamed Bahi, Adams' former liaison to the Muslim community, on his way out of Manhattan federal court.

Bahi, a 41-year-old married dad of two, already pleaded guilty to felony conspiracy to commit wire fraud when he was sentenced to three years probation, including one year on house arrest.

He will be allowed to leave home to go to work, volunteer and attend religious events.

Bahi was expected to serve around six months in prison for reporting "phantom donations" to boost public matching funds for his boss Adams' coffers.

Judge Dale Ho cited the defendant's years of public service to his Muslim community — where he is beloved as an activist - for his noprison decision.

"It's impossible not to be moved by the scope of your work," Ho told Bahi, adding that Adams remains "the elephant in the room.

"Mr. Bahi is placed in the pyramid and there's a notable absence of the apex of that pyramid," Ho said of Hizzoner, whose related charges were famously quashed by President Trump in March.

Bahi received his light sentence after making an emotional plea to the judge.

Indies move to Stefanik

US Rep. Elise Stefanik (R-NY) is gaining ground on Gov. Hochul in what is shaping up to be a bruising general election for the Empire State's next governor — with the Republican firebrand gaining support among independents, a new poll shows.

Stefanik notched a notable 5-point increase in a head-to-head matchup against Hochul in Sienna University's latest survey, shrinking the incumbent's lead in the closely watched race.

The poll, conducted Nov. 10-12 and released Tuesday, has Hochul leading Stefanik 52% to 32% in the general election.

Hochul, meanwhile, didn't gain any extra support in the latest survey. The Democrat led her Republican challenger 52% to 27% in September.

"In the race against Stefanik, Hochul continues to run very strongly with Democrats, 78-9%, however, Stefanik has now widened her lead among Republicans, 79-11%, up from 68-15% in September, and significantly narrowed the gap among independents, with whom Hochul now leads 40-36%, down from 43-25% in September," Siena pollster Steven Greenberg said. A Michigan maniac with the same name as Vice President JD Vance will spend the next two years behind bars for threatening to kill the veep, President Trump, Elon Musk and Donald Trump Jr., officials said.

James Donald "JD" Vance Jr., 67, of Grand Rapids, pleaded guilty to threatening to kill and injure the president and VP in several posts on the BlueSky social media app using the alias, "Diaperjdy," per the US Attorney's Office for the Western District of Michigan.

Vance is not related to the VP, whose birth name is James Donald Bowman.

FBI 'stonewalled' probe: GOP pols

The FBI "stonewalled" the House investigation into Thomas Crooks' attempted assassination of President Trump, two congressmen involved in the probe told The Post

On Monday, The Post reported on violent social media posts that are believed to be tied to Crooks.

The online activity included numerous endorsements of political violence, and a severe turn from being a hardcore advocate for Trump to coming within a few millimeters of killing him.

The FBI never shared those files with the congressional investigation, said Rep. Mike Kelly (R-Pa.)

and Rep. Pat Fallon (R-Texas).

"I think that there's so many unanswered questions about it," Kelly said.

"We all know it wasn't done, it wasn't complete and the reason for that is they can't handle the truth," he said of how the FBI treated the congressional inves-

tigation. "They don't want people to handle the truth."

That was just one of several roadblocks the congressional investigators faced — ranging from Crooks' body being quickly cremated to his blood being washed from the roof he shot from, Kelly said.

The House report was released in December, five months after Crooks nearly killed Trump at a campaign rally in Butler, Pa.

"I don't think any of us came out of that feeling, 'You know what, we really got the answers we were

"We knew we were going to get stonewalled on a lot of stuff," added Kelly, who is from Butler and was at the rally the day Trump was shot.

Fallon called for a new probe in light of the new info — saying he doesn't recall the FBI ever sharing the newly revealed details of Crooks' online footprint when he sat on the congressional investigation committee.

"I don't think it would do any harm at all," Fallon said, echoing Kelly's complaints about the FBI being cagey with Congress. "You can't investigate these things enough."

The FBI did not respond to a request for comment on Tuesday.

Kelly and Fallon were among 13 members of the House who led the bipartisan investigation into the shooting, which concluded that Crooks had little notable digital footprint and left behind little indication that he might be a threat to anyone.

'Terrorism-style attacks'

But the new trove of social media posts paints a different picture.

Crooks' activity online and on social media ranged from researching how to produce homemade bombs and how to shoot an AR-15 assault rifle "as fast as possible," calling for the deaths of Jews and politicians, to advocating violence as the only way to bring about political change.

"IMO the only way to fight the

gov is with terrorism style attacks, sneak a bomb into an essential building and set it off before anyone sees you, track down any important people/politicians/military leaders etc and try to assassinate them," he wrote in an Aug. 5, 2020, post.

Crooks' online accounts also had videos of him practicing shooting stances with what appeared to be a real handgun in his bedroom.

But after reports of that activity emerged, FBI Director Kash Patel doubled down and insisted in an X post that Crooks' digital footprint was unremarkable.

Many aren't buying it, however, and are demanding the assassination attempt be re-examined.

"Those questions are definitely deserving of answers and I understand why the public wants those answers, and I believe the president does too," White House Press Secretary Karoline Leavitt told The Post's Miranda Devine on "Pod Force One."

Zo hike on NY biz would top all states





HEN Zohran Mamdani and his supporters talk of taxing the rich, they usually mean it on a personal level — referring to his proposal to raise income taxes on New York City residents with annual incomes over \$1 million.

He estimated this would raise \$4 billion a year to help fund his expansive agenda, including universal child care.

Less attention was paid to the larger of Mamdani's tax bids — a proposal to raise \$5 billion by elevating New York's top tax rate on corporations from 7.25% to match New Jersey's highest-in-the nation level of 11.5%.

"If it works for our regional neighbor, why can't it work for us?" Mamdani said in a June interview.

After all, as his campaign issue guide put it: "New York's corporate tax rate now lags behind 15 other states and Washington, DC."

This was highly misleading, however.

In New York City, Long Island and five northern suburban counties — where the bulk of the state

tax base is concentrated — the corporate tax rate is compounded by a 30% surcharge for the Metropolitan Transportation Authority.

This raises the top rate throughout the region to 9.43%.

Mamdani's proposal would take this up to 13.7%, easily topping all states.

That's not all: In addition to the state and regional corporate tax surcharge, New York City imposes its own corporate income tax of 8.85% (or 9% on finance firms), bringing the current combined state and city rate to well over 18%.

Stacking rates

Adding this to the mix, Mamdani's tax hike would bring the combined New York state and city corporate tax rate to 22.5% — above the federal rate of 21%.

As economists point out, higher corporate taxes don't dissipate into the ether — nor are they subtracted from notionally lavish CEO paychecks.

One way or another, they are absorbed by shareholders (including pension and retirement savings plans), workers, clients and customers.

While a portion of corporate taxes on multistate firms is exported beyond New York's borders, any new tax hike also would come on the top of this year's \$1.4 billion increase in the separate MTA-dedicated payroll tax on large employers in the city and suburbs.

So be sure, given the need for formal state approval of both tax increases, the new mayor is highly unlikely to get everything he wants — or even most of it — from Gov. Hochul and his fellow Democrats in the Legislature.

However, he's equally unlikely to come away empty-handed.

Hochul's mid-September endorsement of Mamdani included the disclaimer that she wasn't "aligned with him on every issue," taxes being the primary point of difference.

"I'm not raising taxes on highnet-worth people right now, because we cannot have them leave the state," she explained before the election.

The governor is hardly an antitax hard-liner, though.

Her most recent budget included a preemptive five-year extension of the significantly higher "millionaire tax" rates signed into law by Andrew Cuomo in 2021, which were otherwise scheduled to expire in 2027.

Taunted by "tax the rich" chants at a pre-election Mamdani rally, Hochul failed to make the obvious response: Thanks to a tax hike she's perpetuated, New York City's millionaire earners already are taxed at the highest rates in the country.

Primary concern

While still sounding reluctant to go along with a tax hike targeting individual income millionaires, the governor pointedly didn't deny a Politico report last week that she and her staff had begun "quiet, back-of-the-napkin style discussions about how to increase the corporate tax rate."

She cited uncertainty over the impact of federal budget cuts as a reason to keep options open in planning for her next budget, due in January.

Not incidentally, she faces a Democratic primary challenge on the left from Lt. Gov. Antonio Delgado.

Members of the large Democratic majorities in the state Senate and Assembly already are on record as supporting both higher corporate and personal income taxes, albeit at lower rates than Mamdani has proposed.

In an election year, they won't want to risk primaries from the new mayor's energized supporters.

And so, as usual in Albany, the buck will stop in the governor's office.

The top 1% of state taxpayers pay over 40% of the state's income tax, and raising the federal levy increases the burden, Hach said.

Long Island alone has lost tens of thousands of highearning families and smallbusiness owners in the past five years, he claimed.

Suozzi told The Post last week that revenue raised from a federal tax hike would be used to lower state and local taxes.

An illegal immigrant and international criminal fugitive managed to get a legal New York state driver's li-cense to pull off a jewelry heist - using the name of British soccer great David Beckham, Nassau County officials said Tuesday.

The Romanian national, who snuck across the US border via Mexico in 2022, is part of a "gypsy" crime ring and has used so many aliases that cops don't know his real name, County Executive Bruce Blakeman said at a press conference.

"We were visited, apparently, by a celebrity in Nassau County - David Beckham," Blakeman told reporters. "Although this isn't a soccer player, this is a celebrity because this individual is wanted in many countries."

Nassau cops said the fugitive and his girlfriend, identified as Veta Rostas, walked into Kravitz Jewelry in Oceanside on Oct. 23 and slipped out with an \$11,000 diamond bracelet.

Cops used face-recognition technology from security surveillance cameras and released an intelligence bulletin that reached a crime analyst in the UK who ID'd the fugitive.

Nassau County cops were then able to track him down and bust him Sunday in the jewelry heist.

The scandal over the license is just the latest example of illegal immigrants getting driving privileges, primarily in migrant-

friendly sanctuary states.
In September, Oklahoma Gov. Kevin Stitt flipped out after cops

President Trump's bor-der czar Tom Homan warned New Yorkers will see increased federal immigration enforcement ahead of Mavor-elect Zohran Mamdani taking office.

Homan, during an interview Tuesday morning on Fox News, said he also plans to hold Mayor Adams' administration accountable for its commitment to reopen ICE's office on Rikers Island.

The vows come just weeks before democratic socialist Mamdani is set to be sworn in as mayor, replacing Adams, who had been an ally of Homan and the Trump administration.

The woman Larry Summers asked for advice on how to get "horizontal" with in emails to Jeffrey Epstein is a high-flying economist, The Post can reveal.

The ex-Treasury secretary was referring to Chinese macroeconomist Keyu Jin, 43 — then a tenured London School of Economics professor and Harvard graduate - and daughter of a top Chinese associate of President Xi Jinping.

In several messages from 2018 and 2019, married former Harvard president Summers, 70, confided in his "wing man" Epstein about a woman he was

Throughout their correspondence, Summers and Epstein referred to the woman as "peril" - never using her name in messages, but he also forwarded some of her emails for com-

mentary, in which Jin's name is unredacted.

In one such exchange, Summers asked Epstein whether it was "meaningful" to talk about the probability of "my get-ting horizontal w peril."

"Ur better at understanding Chinese women than at probability theory," Summers told Epstein.

Epstein went on to suggest the probability of Summers ending up in bed with her was "0,"

then added: "she is never ever going to find another Larry summers. Probability ZERO."

People speculated online the nickname was drawn from the racist, anti-immigrant "yellow peril" trope of the late 19th and early 20th centuries.

Civil-rights attorney Alejandra Caraballo, a clinical in-structor at Harvard Law School's Cyberlaw Clinic, described the exchanges as "absolutely disgusting" and wrote on-

IRACLES come in all shapes and circumstances, but here is a truly remarkable one: The New York Times has said something positive about President Trump.

All he had to do was get most of the world to back his sweeping plan for bringing peace to Gaza. It was a long shot, but he and his skilled negotiating team pulled it off.

So much so that a Monday Times headline called it "A Major Breakthrough."

The story went on to declare that the United Nations Security Council vote to support the president's plan represents "a major diplomatic victory for the Trump administration."

It is that, and a helluva lot more, including the fact that it already has saved untold lives, both Jewish and Arab, and will save many more each day if it is fully implemented.

The 13-0 vote, with China and Russia abstaining, increases what was already the only chance for a broad Mideast peace the region has had in decades.

It is also worth noting that China and Russia, as permanent members of the Security Council, chose not to use their veto powers, which reveals that they, too, realize there is no realistic alternative in Gaza other than more war.

Hissy fit to print

One takeaway of the good news is that a word of caution is in order to the Times reporter whose byline is on the complimentary article. Farnaz Fassihi covers the UN, and so she might have missed the Times' newsroom edict that all employees shall speak only evil of Trump.

The daily drumbeat of anti-Trump screeds in the leftist paper is as predictable as it nauseating. The formula is mindlessly simple: If Trump is for it, the Times is rabidly against it.

Facts and fairness don't enter into the decision.

That could mean some of Fassihi's rabid colleagues will use social media to try to drive her out of her job, as they have others who dared to display insufficient hate for Trump and his every word, idea and action.

For the rest of the world, the Security Council vote marks what I see as Miracle No. 2 that Trump and his team have delivered for Gaza.

The first came in September when he unveiled the 20-point plan for a cease-fire and a hostage and prisoner swap.



Times praise for Don? A miracle!

It seemed like a waste of time when he first talked about the idea, but with some arm-twisting, Israel signed on immediately. So, too, did much of Europe and important regional powers, including Turkey, Egypt, Saudi Arabia and Qatar.

The Arab buy-in, especially from Qatar, which has been Hamas' principal funder and protector, gave the plan a burst of momentum that even the terror group's leaders could not ignore.

They soon saw the light, gave their approval and began returning the first of the 20 living hostages they had been savagely holding in Gaza tunnels for more than two years, along with the remains of others who were almost certainly murdered in captivity.

The weeks since have been among the quietest since the war began with Hamas' savage invasion of Oct. 7, 2003. And now UN

support offers reasons to hope the guns will stay silent.

Still, there remains a large hurdle, and getting the Trump plan over it would constitute Miracle No. 3.

It will need to be achieved if all the dramatic and lasting benefits the plan envisions are to be realized.

MAGA hat trick

As I see it, Miracle No. 3 would be the disarming of Hamas. Without it, all the other gains are vulnerable and subject to being reversed by crazy dead-enders who live to kill Jews.

Hamas savages also seem to enjoy killing fellow Palestinians in Gaza, as recent events show. The videos of their gruesome public executions capture the hell on Earth they have created.

The White House maintains the terror group promised to give up all its weaponry when it endorsed the original plan, but there's no sign that is actually happening.

A fall-back possibility is the plan's provision calling for an International Stabilization Force to help demilitarize the strip and secure and maintain peace.

The force, to be made up of troops from various countries, will also take over land held by Israel inside Gaza as the IDF withdraws.

That provision is one that makes the measure's adoption by the Security Council so crucial. Several countries have said approval would make it more likely they would contribute armed forces to the stabilization group because Security Council passage makes the Trump plan legally binding under international law.

Another key measure in the plan

calls for a "technocratic, apolitical Palestinian committee," to deliver basic services in Gaza.

In part to satisfy Israeli concerns about the committee, it will be supervised by an international body called the "Board of Peace," which will be headed by Trump. Former British Prime Minister Tony Blair is set to join the group, which will also handle the envisioned international funding for Gaza redevelopment.

Meanwhile, another part of the plan declares that Hamas and other factions agree to not have any role in governing Gaza. And all "military, terror, and offensive infrastructure, including tunnels and weapon production facilities, are to be destroyed."

Palestinian state-craft

The sweeping yet detailed plan reflects Trump's ambitious commitment to peace in the Middle East. Another sign is the lavish praise he heaped on Saudi Arabia's crown prince, Mohammed bin Salman, during a White House visit Tuesday.

In giving MBS a pass on having any role or knowledge about the 2018 murder of a critic turned Washington Post columnist, Trump exhibited how eager he is to get the prince to join the Abraham Accords, a breakthrough pact achieved in his first term, and fully normalize relations with Israel.

In the past, the Saudis have insisted that a Palestinian state has to be part of any deal. There is mention of such an entity in the Trump plan, but no commitment, and the president has said that creating one now would be rewarding Hamas.

He's right about that, and Israeli Prime Minister Benjamin Netanyahu has declared that such a state will not happen on his watch. Nor is there a sign of any possible Israeli successor who would endorse such a state after what Hamas did on Oct. 7 and since.

In addition, there are many practical complications, including the actual borders. And given Trump's statements about not wanting to reward Hamas, I don't see how a Palestinian state emerges from the Gaza rubble.

If the Saudi ruler is as smart as his fans say, he will not allow the issue to stand in the way of all the good things that would result for millions of people in the region under the Trump plan.

Indeed, the plan is so good and far reaching that, if fully implemented, the president should hands down win that elusive Nobel Peace Prize.

Faux foodie influencer 'ripped off'

Brooklyn's dine-and-dash influencer shows no signs of stopping.

Fresh off her arraignment on theft of service charges Friday — after she was arrested five times for non-payment at trendy Williamsburg restaurants — Pei "Lu" Chung was almost immediately accused of ripping off even more restaurants.

The faux influencer was arrested twice Saturday, at Sea Thai and Michelin-star Italian hot spot Misi, NYPD reports show, and given supervised release.

On Monday night, Chung took to Instagram to post photos of a full mezze platter, lamb and coconut milk pudding from popular Israeli restaurant 12 Chairs — where she walked out without paying her bill, management claimed to The Post.

"She left and didn't pay," a source close to the restaurant told The Post, adding that 12 Chairs did not call po-

Chung, 34, has been arrested seven times since late October, after skipping out on high-tally tabs at restaurants like Peter Luger, Francie and Lavender Lake.

'Dressed to the nines'

Owners and chefs told The Post Chung comes in "dressed to the nines," takes photos of her food, then tries to barter with social media posts or uses credit cards that are inevitably

A manager at Peter Luger alleged that Chung even tried to offer a sexual favor to cover her meal, The Post reported Sunday.

Former friends told The Post that, prior to her savory scams, Chung was a regular on the city's glittering social scene — elegantly dressed in Prada and Louis Vuitton at classical music galas and nightclubs - but disappeared a couple of years ago.

Born in Taiwan, Chung says on her personal website that she studied ballet and classical piano, started playing the violin at age 3 and earned a 99th percentile rank on that country's national exam. She also notes that she was "operating a rifle at age 17."

After earning a master's degree in fine arts at the National University of Kaohsiung, she seems to have moved to New York around 2019 to attend Pratt University on a "full-ride merit scholarship," according to her LinkedIn profile, studying information experience design and information technology.

She was regularly photographed with Taiwanese socialites around Manhattan in 2021, partying at the Di-Menna Center for Classical Music in Midtown in October 2021 and at Buddakan in the Meatpacking District.

A friend who met Chung during the COVID-19 pandemic told The Post they bonded over classical music and that she was active on the Taiwanese

social circuit in New York.

"She invited me to concerts and museums. We also had meals together several times, either alone or with friends," the young man said, asking to remain anonymous. "She treated me before, after I invited her to a concert. She wasn't the kind of girl that expects guys to pay. When we went out as a group, she also paid for her portion. I don't know about her other actual dates though.

"She was always very polite, wellmannered, and showed strong interest in art and education. She's a smart girl."

'Off the grid'

But things took a dark turn, the friend said, when Chung suddenly started talking about an "ex-boyfriend."

"She had been acting a bit strange, so I reached out to check in and ask if she was OK or needed any help. She started messaging me saying she wasn't well — that her ex had come to New York, was stalking her, and that she was scared. We spoke on the phone a few times because it seemed like she needed someone to talk to and calm her down," the friend said, adding that Chung sounded like "a completely different person" than before.

'It felt like there were two sides of her, and she was extremely distressed . . . different person, different voice, tone, personality and way of thinking. At one point, she was so frightened that she asked if I could stay with her and pretend to be her boyfriend. I told her that if she truly needed someone for safety, I could go accompany her. But her behavior became increasingly

unusual, so I never went."

Then, the friend said, Chung disappeared.

Another source confirmed she 'went off the grid all of the sudden" after December 2021.

"A lot of our friends stopped seeing her. She doesn't come out anymore,' said the source, who asked to withhold his name. "We tried to see if she's OK. We got concerned. We're like, 'Why did you stop coming out?' She mentioned it was something about her ex that he was tracking her down. She was in hiding.'

After that, the source said Chung, "didn't reply and she was gone. She unfollowed me. All the people that I know who once knew her don't talk to her."

'Semi-retired'

According to Chung's LinkedIn, she briefly worked as a contract user-experience designer for companies including Chase, Comcast and Vanguard. But her last posted job was in March 2023 — and she lists herself as "semi-retired."

She began posting influencer-style food photos that year — from places like L'abeille, a French restaurant in Tribeca, and Jean-Georges.

Chung, who lives in a luxury apartment tower in Williamsburg, also tags brands for the clothes and accessories she's wearing: Prada, Dior, Cartier, Burberry.

Chung also seemingly got a new plan up her designer sleeve.

According to a Reddit user who claims to have matched with Chung on the dating app Hinge, she's ready to exchange her nightlife knowledge for tips on equity trading.

Dasher free to 'scam'

The drippy dine-and-dasher repeatedly busted for allegedly scamming top city restaurants is still free to fraudulently feast after a Brooklyn judge released her without bail over her latest stunt.

Prada-loving Pei Chung, 34, was cut loose on supervised release at her arraignment Sunday by Brooklyn Criminal Court Judge Jevet Johnson despite prosecutors seeking to lock up the accused stingy diner for scamming two more hot spots over the weekend.

Brooklyn prosecutors sought \$1,500 cash bail or \$3,500 bond to keep the wannabe influencer behind bars after she allegedly noshed on pricey plates at a pair of posh Williamsburg restaurants Friday into Saturday, then couldn't, or wouldn't, pay.

She had already been busted five times since late October for allegedly pulling the same stunt at other local hot spots — including a Michelin star restaurant — near her home in a luxury high-rise.

As in her previous cases, Chung was charged with theft of services in the weekend incidents, a non-bail-eligible rap, before she was freed by the judge. It wasn't clear why prosecutors sought bail.

Legal experts said Chung's continued stunt could eventually land her behind bars on enhanced charges if prosecutors decide to charge her.

"If she does this 10 times or more, they could charge her with scheme to defraud, which is a felony," defense lawyer Mark Bederow told The Post on Tuesday. "At least for now, unless she spends over a \$1,000 or uses a stolen credit card, they are going to be stuck with misdemeanors and have to deal with her."

But the real deterrence for Chung could likely come with sentencing if she is convicted, should a judge choose to throw the book at her to try to keep her from reoffending.

Defense lawyer Jason Goldman told The Post that prosecutors could also refuse to offer Chung — whose lawyer didn't return a request for comment — a plea agreement to lessen her sentence. Kyle Schnitzer

Worldwide job hunt on taxpayers' dime

He's leavin' on a jet plane, don't know if swagger will be back again...

Eric Adams has spent his final weeks as New York City's mayor flying around the world on the taxpayers' dime — as he admits he's hunting for a jet-setting new gig with first-class benefits.

Speculation over his future job prospects comes as Hizzoner bolted to Uzbekistan in Central Asia on Tuesday, after wrapping up a high-profile, five-day jaunt in Israel.

Sources said Adams is leaning toward a job offer with an Israeli-owned international construction company, but still has potential ambassadorships with President Trump's administration in the pipeline, with one to the Republic of the Congo recently being floated.
"Countries are calling me and

asking me to come and do what I did in New York City," he told reporters on Election Day.

Adams, who has roughly six weeks left in office, has noticeably been more absent from the city since he finally dropped his long shot re-election bid on Sept.

Within days of that fateful decision. Adams traveled to Alba-

nia — a Balkan nation where his raunchy rapper son Jordan Coleman famously competed in an "American Idol" knockoff.

Adams then flew to Israel Friday, his second visit to the coun-

He took veiled swipes at Mayor-elect Zohran Mamdani during the jaunt, which Adams' office said was meant to highlight the threat of growing antisemitism and his administration's commitment to protecting Jewish New Yorkers.

Adams met with Prime Minister Benjamin Netanyahu on Monday, and on Tuesday, visited a kibbutz attacked by Hamas on Oct. 7, 2023 and then the offices of a cybersecurity company, Armis, and a weather technology

firm, Tomorrow.io.

The mayor's fondness for flying off to faraway places has been a frequent feature and punchline of his public life, notably his lavish, perk-filled Turkish Airlines trips while serving as Brooklyn borough president which led to his since-dropped historic federal bribery indictment.

Grounded

His first and only term saw him travel to Mexico, Ecuador and Colombia on a voyage to visit the dangerous Darién Gap at the height of the migrant crisis in 2023. He also visited Greece and Qatar.

Those conspicuous overseas trips stopped after Adams' corruption case cast a shadow over his globetrotting.

The dismissal of Adams' case arguably killed his re-election chances, but he pressed with his campaign for months — even as many pols, Trump included, worried it would help socialist mayoral contender Mamdani's chances of winning.

Adams ultimately faced an extraordinary pressure campaign to stand aside and give former Gov. Andrew Cuomo a fighting chance of thwarting Mamdani.



'Wall, no window seat'

These travelers unknowingly threw their money out the window.

When you book a window seat on a plane, you're likely expecting to be seated next to a window — but some airlines argue otherwise.

In response to a class-action lawsuit against Delta Air Lines and United Airlines filed by passengers who paid extra money to sit in "window" seats, only to be seated next to an empty wall, United has asked a federal judge to dismiss it.

The airline is arguing that a window seat means a seat next to a wall - not necessarily a seat with a view.

The use of the word 'window' in reference to a particular seat cannot reasonably be interpreted as a promise that the seat will have an exterior window view," the airline's lawyers wrote in a motion to dismiss the case.

"Rather, the word 'window' identifies the position of the seat — i.e., next to the wall of the main body of the aircraft."

The lawyers also noted that United's contract of carriage does not explicitly guarantee that a window seat will have an exterior view next to it.

One plaintiff in the suit against United, Aviva Copaken, claimed that she paid as much as \$169.99 for a window seat, and when she boarded, there was only a view of the cabin wall.

Some rows none

Boeing 737s have at least one row with a missing window at the window seat because of the placement of components such as ducts or electrical conduits - and these planes make up over half of United's fleet. Missing windows can also be found on Airbus A320s and Boeing 757s.

Carter Greenbaum, who is representing plaintiffs against United and Delta, told People, "As airlines have begun charging for services that were once free, passengers should at least expect upfront disclosure of the fees and that if they pay an extra fee, they will get the product they paid for.'

A bald-space lie

A former Air Force Intelligence officer has pleaded guilty to lying to law enforcement when she claimed her then-estranged astronaut wife committed the first crime in space, prosecutors said.

Summer Worden, 50, faces up to five years in prison and a \$250,000 fine after pleading guilty Thursday to falsely alleging her now ex-wife, Anna McClain, accessed her bank account from the International Space Station, said the US Attorney's Office for the Southern District of Texas.

Worden accused McClain

of guessing the password to her bank account to access it in January 2019 while deployed on a six-month ISS mission, prosecutors said.

The false claim — leveled amid a separation and parental dispute ahead of their divorce in 2020 — sparked Federal Trade Commission and NASA investigations, The New York Times reported.

Investigators determined Worden had granted McClain access to the account and other records, the feds said.

Worden will be sentenced Zoe Hussain Feb. 12.

Calls to bust the filibuster

Karoline Leavitt, chief White House flack, doubled down on her calls for the GOP to abolish the filibuster to pass President Trump's agenda, in an interview with "Pod Force One" released Wednesday.

Leavitt argued that much of the president's efforts to reform federal voting laws in particular would be eased if Senate Republicans agreed to do away with the 60-vote threshold needed to pass most legislation in their chamber.

"Republicans need to get off their butts and move, and that's what the president wants to see them do, and that's what the American people are expecting," she said.

"There's so much more work to do — election integrity, voter ID, getting rid of universal mail-in ballots — all of that can be done if Congress works together and gets rid of the filibuster," she added.

"So, the President is definitely talking a lot about that, both publicly and privately. I know he's expressed his opinion on that to leaders in the Senate who may agree or disagree. We'll have to see how it shakes out."

Senate Majority Leader John Thune (R-SD), in his first speech after assuming his position, vowed to keep the filibuster

"[The Founding Fathers] made the Senate smaller and senators' terms of office longer, with the intention of creating a more stable, more thoughtful, and more deliberative legislative body to check ill-considered or intemperate legislation," he said in a Jan. 3 address on the Senate floor.

Without the filibuster, legislation could be passed by a simple 51-vote majority.

WH chief spokesperson remakes office

White House press secretary Karoline Leavitt touted the control she has of the briefing room and defended a recent crackdown on reporter access in an interview on "Pod Force One" out Wednesday.

"I try, thank you," Leavitt replied when "Pod Force One" host Miranda Devine gushed that she ruled the White House press briefing room with "an iron fist."

"I prepare a lot for the briefings, and I walk in there with a good grip on what they're going to ask, because I read and I watch and I prepare all day, all morning," Leavitt, 28, explained.

Be 'professional'

Leavitt, the youngest White House press secretary in history, stressed that she wants her team to be "professional" with reporters.

"The press briefing room can be combative, and sometimes it is behind the scenes as well, but I tell our team that we need to be professional and get them facts," she said.

During Leavitt's tenure, the White House has cracked down on the press, taking control of the pool reporter rotation from the White House Correspondents' Association

Pool reporters are journalists who get closer access to the president than the rest of the press corps, with the task of sending their colleagues notes and other information.

Late last month, the Trump administration

also restricted reporters from freely wandering to the Upper Press area, where Leavitt and other White House communications officials work. It's above the Lower Press area, where the press briefing room is located.

Under the new rules, reporters have to make appointments to get into the Upper Press.

"What was happening up here is now that we have taken over the responsibilities of the National Security Council, thanks to the restructuring of Secretary [of State Marco] Rubio when he became national security adviser," Leavitt explained.

"So we felt it became very inappropriate for reporters to be loitering around sensitive information in our offices."

Leavitt claimed that, privately, many reporters are OK with the new system as long as they still have access to appointments.

One step the Trump administration has taken to expand access for reporters is its creation of a new seat in the press briefing room for independent media.

The White House press team also added a dedicated new-media spot in the pool rotation.

In reflecting on the differences between the first and second Trump administrations, Leavitt concluded that the media treats the president with more respect.

"I think they realized that maybe there's something to this guy. If 70 million Americans elected him, not once, but twice, maybe we should have a little bit more respect."

pushed: her husband is 32 years her senior.

The age gap left her parents a little skeptical at first, Leavitt said, until

Makeup big: Trans-pushing parents 'weirdos'

Makeup mogul Jeffree Star ripped progressive parents shoving gender

and transgender issues in their kids' faces as "f--king weirdos."

The 40-year-old OG influencer, widely recognized for his flamboyant looks and long locks, waded into the divisive issue on Monday, bluntly telling The Skinny Confidential blog's podcast that children should not be encouraged to choose their gender.

"Why are we encouraging our kids to be a different gender and feed them false information when they're so young?" Star (inset) told "The Him and Her Show" hosts.

'When I grew up and started looking different, my mother encouraged me to just be myself. When I started wearing makeup and being more feminine and wanting to do certain things ... it wasn't like 'Oh my God, Jeffree needs, what do they call it

now — gender affirming care?'

"It's like when you're a tomboy. Did your mom . . . did she cut your t-ts off at 13? Nowadays, it's all these f--king

weirdos telling their kids, 'OMG you like a Barbie? You're a woman!' No that's just a little boy experimenting and not knowing what the f--k he's doing."

Star, who noted he is a man who just happens to look feminine, said he was never "sexualized weird" as a child.

"Why are we putting in cartoons, trans flags and all this stuff? I don't agree with it, I think it's too young," he said. "Why does a 5-year-old watching a Netflix cartoon show need to know about that right now?"

The beauty icon also ripped into pronoun culture, arguing that identifying as gay, lesbian or bisexual was a sexuality choice — not a gender. "You can only be a man, female or

trans," Star said.

"What you think your identity is

has nothing to do with what you're sexually attracted to."

Star raged, too, that the LGBTQI acronym should be stripped back to just "LGB."

Down on pronouns

"LGB, that is your preference for what you are attracted to and what you like," Star continued. "Your identity issues and who you think you are is so separate. I don't agree that they should be together."

The button-pushing makeup bigwig, who rose to fame creating tutorials on YouTube, has gone viral in the past over his remarks on nonbinary pronouns.

"You're not 'they' and 'them,' " Star said in a 2023 podcast interview. 'You're trans, you're male or you're female."

'They' and 'them' and all that extra s--t that we added during the pandemic. Because everyone is so bored in their f--king houses they just started to make up more s--t."

Lower tab to get high on weed

It's getting cheaper to get high in New York.

The average price of pot has plummeted 17% since legalization in New York state, with a market ramp up that has boosted the availability of marijuana brands in more stores, industry officials said.

In 2023, the average "unit price" for cannabis was \$38.61. It's now \$32.15, the state Office of Cannabis Management reports.

The number of licensed pot stores in the Empire State has soared past 500, stocking products from a growing group of farmers growing marijuana and more cultivators manufacturing gummies, vapes and even beverages.

Regulators with OCM said it's normal for prices to come down as more pot stores open and more products become available, spurring competition.

Rise of an antisemitic 'pod piper'

T'S tempting to think that young leftists who flock to streamer Hasan Piker and edgelords who listen to podcaster Nick Fuentes are two sides of the same coin.

Both are radical influencers who are pulling boys to the fanatical edges of their side of the political

But, while Piker's far-left fans swap radical ideas about socialism and Israel on message boards, echoing the streamer's disturbing rhetoric, Fuentes' fans seem to be up to something quite different.

The "groypers" — as they are known — who venerate Fuentes appear far more interested in posting the most offensive memes possible than engaging in actual political discourse. They are spraying an indiscriminate firehose of offense wherever they possibly can, in a cathartic rebellion against the politically correct culture they grew up

"You can call me a Nazi — you better be careful," Fuentes recently warned on his podcast "Because if I'm a Nazi, then there's millions of young people that are following a f--king Nazi, so you better be careful about those words."

'Groypers' fall in line

Fuentes' influence is taking off online — and increasingly in real life, too. Over the weekend, "Nick Fuentes was right about Israel" was written in chalk on a bike path on Stanford University's campus, according to StopAntisemitism. The school did not respond to a request for comment.

Fuentes is a Holocaust denier who regularly espouses antisemitic views and advocates for an "America First" agenda that puts immediate domestic interests before all international conflicts.

Meanwhile, tweets like, "We have a leader. Fall in line," referring to Fuentes, regularly get tens of thousands of likes on X.

"By using humor and presenting himself as a moral authority, he packages hateful ideas in ways that can seem normal, entertaining or even principled," Oren Segal of the ADL told The Post.

"Parents should know that his content can pull teens into spaces where antisemitism and bigotry are openly encouraged."

The 27-year-old host of the "America First" show has a million followers on X and gets hundreds of thousands of views on his show, which airs daily on Rumble (he was kicked off YouTube for hate speech in 2020). According to The New



York Times, his views on the platform, where he now has 525,000 followers, have quintupled in just over a vear.

He casually drops the N-word, has declared a "crusade" against women in politics and publicly professed love for Hitler in an opening to a speech. His predominantly young male disciples are eating it all up.

Fuentes once commanded his followers in a pledge during his show, asking them to "raise your right hand, repeat after me: I will kill, rape and die for Nicholas J. Fuentes.'

His fans call themselves "groypers" in a reference to an alt-right meme of a cartoon toad. According to the ADL, they "believe they are fighting against demographic and cultural changes that are destroying the 'true America' - a white, Christian nation."

The tweets and memes they share are almost as incoherent as they are offensive. A groyper account with more than 40,000 followers on X posted a photoshopped image of Donald Trump smiling at his phone while apparently listening to Nick Fuentes's podcast. A speech bubble says, "Jews run society, women need to shut the f--k up and blacks need to be imprisoned for the most part."

Trump met Fuentes in 2022 when Kanye West brought him to a dinner with him, but there is no evidence the president has ever listened to his podcast.

While the picture is fake, the quote is one of Fuentes' own. Why offend one group, when you can kill three birds with one stone?

A disturbed father wrote on X, "My son is 19. Yesterday I asked a group of friends if they ever heard of Nick. They all have [the aforementioned quote] memorized and repeated it like a mantra to me."

In the online groyper world, the lower you go, the more praise you receive. "Women are so cringe like how do you f--k up a suicide," an account called Voluntary Conscript Groyper posted on X. "I swear I've seen more 'failed suicides' from women than real ones ... It's all attention bulls--t. If [you] were serious you would tie a noose around [your] neck and be done with it."

Kids who grew up in an era of political correctness are stomping on every PC eggshell they can come up with, hiding behind anonymous avatars of frog cartoons as they unleash their pent-up anger and one-up each other with how far they're willing to go. But how much of it is simply courting shock value, and how much is a reflection of what they're actually thinking?

The same can be asked of Fuentes. Is he the same to politics as Andrew Tate is to women's rights?

Appalling speech

In a recent episode of his podcast, Ben Shapiro pulled some of Fuentes' most shocking statements through the years. He said of black people under Jim Crow in one clip, "Who cares? Enough with the Jim Crow stuff. Who cares? 'I had to drink out of a different water fountain.' Big f--king deal . . . It was better for them, better for us, better in general."

In another he proclaimed, "A lot of women want to be raped ... There's a lot of women who really want a guy to beat the s--t out of them, but part of it is that they have to pretend that they don't."

And in a third clip, Fuentes declared, "White people are every single bit justified in being racist, every single bit justified, to the extent that it means going out of your way to avoid black people when you see them."

Shapiro is a vocal opponent of Fuentes, particularly taking issue with his antisemitic views.

In an interview with Tucker Carlson in late October, Fuentes said, "As far as the Jews are concerned, you cannot actually divorce Israel and the neocons and all those things that you talk about from Jewishness: ethnicity, religion, identity." He also called Jews "a stateless people" and described them as "unassimilable."

And his followers echo this antisemitism. In a world full of pearlclutching teachers and suffocating wokeness, a grassroots ascendance of edgelording kids was surely inevitable. Until young people no longer feel like they can't say what they really mean, some will resort to saying what they don't really mean just to get a rise.

A short time later, the call captures the man quarreling with "Charlie" about money before gunshots erupt. Then everything fell quiet.

The couple, who operated a home improvement business out of their house, were pronounced dead at the scene by responders.

Through the 911 call and "additional investigative means," detectives quickly identified Anthony Louis Reyes, 61, a business associate and friend, as a suspect, police said.

When a cop tried to pull over Reyes' vehicle, the suspect fled, triggering a seven-minute chase before officers caught up and ar-

Wait — what the hole?

Brace yourselves, New York according to experts, the best bagels are no longer boiled and baked in the Big Apple, but in Texas.

The shock schmear on Gotham's reputation came courtesy of a panel of judges at the 2025 BagelFest, held at Citi Field over the weekend — where Starship Bagel, an upstart from Fort Worth, took top honors over dozens of local greats.

In addition, the People's Choice award at the event — attended by thousands of New Yorkers — went to Baltik's Bagel in Richmond, Va.

Brooklynite Sam Silverman, who founded the festival six years ago, told The Post he stands by the astonishing verdict — and says it's time for New York bagel shops to up their game.

NY challenge

"I think [New York bagel makers] need to be more competitive," said Silverman, 33, noting that too many local joints think they don't even need to attend the event to defend their honor. "Bagel shops from around the city, Long Island and New Jersey need to step it up and put their product to the test. Let's duke it out!"

He did note that one of his local favorites, the Whitestone, Queens-based Utopia Bagels, snagged the top prize last year.

The surprising slight comes amid a recent shift in the New York scene, where brash new entrants like Apollo Bagel draw lengthy lines for their lighter sourdough bagels, a style popularized in cities like Los Angeles.

BagelFest began in 2019 as a semi-small gathering in Bushwick though Silverman said he first cooked up the idea in 2017 when he realized New York City had never hosted a festival of this kind before. Approximately 300 fans got together the first year.

Since then, the event has grown into a comprehensive trade and consumer show. This year, around 2,000 attendees joined in the making, judging and eating of their favorite carb creation.

Recipes ranging from tradi-

tional favorites to new spins on classics are swapped at the event during live demos and tastings. Bagel-making classes, panel discussions with top industry leaders and networking opportunities are also included.

Additionally, Silverman said, the gathering propels the expansion and funding of established and up-and-coming bagel shops that are awarded each year with some of BagelFest's most significant achievements.

"[In 2021] was the first time we held a Best Bagels competition," the Greenpointer explained. "To everyone's surprise, a small upstart from Westport, Conn., beat out all these really established shops. It was PopUp Bagels."

Outsiders add variety

PopUp, another shop that has brought a new type of bagel experience to the city, has since gone on to build a cult following and has expanded to scores of locations nationwide.

Mike Varley, a longtime contest judge and creator of EverythingisEverything.NYC, a website where he has reviewed more

than 200 bagel shops across the five boroughs, agrees the growing presence of non-local bagels at BagelFest is a good thing for the NYC bagel scene.

Strike 3 for Don-pardoned con

Eliyahu "Eli" Weinstein, 51, a man who has also used the alias Mike Konig, was handed a 37-year sentence in Trenton.


Prosecutors estimated he milked approximately \$35

The con artist's prior two convictions, for which he was originally set to serve 24 years in prison, were commuted by Trump on Jan. 19, 2021, his last full day before leaving office.

Influencer fraud trial

Chiara Ferragni, a wildly glamorous fashion influencer who still boasts more than 28 million Instagram followers, was once a fixture on the Big Ap-

ple fashion scene. At New York Fashion Week, she would post pictures of herself sitting front row at coveted catwalk shows, cozying up to Karlie Kloss and "The Real Housewives of New York City" star Rebecca Minkoff, and using landmarks like the Empire State Building as backdrops in enviable Instagram snaps

shared with social-media fans. And when she donned a crocheted lace Christian Dior dress to marry Italian rapper Federico Leonardo "Fedez" Lucia in 2018, her extravagant wedding at a 19th-century Sicilian palazzo was featured in American Vogue, not to mention observed by a documentary

film and reality TV crew. But the 38-year-old Italian — who used her fame to build a fortune in the millions of dollars — is now facing five years in prison after being indicted on charges of aggravated fraud in her

home country. She already appeared at the Court of Milan for pretrial hearings on Sept. 23 and Nov. 4, with another court appearance set for next Tuesday.

She's been fined \$1.27 million for conning the public into thinking she was selling Christmas treats for charity when the vast bulk of cash was going straight into her pockets (she paid an extra \$1.39 million for a similar scheme over fake claims that Easter eggs would also underwrite a kids' hospital).

The Italian government went further after those fines, though, charging her with aggravated fraud at a criminal trial this month in Milan. If she's convicted, Ferragni could spend up to five years behind bars. Ferragni has gone from being the darling of Dior, Gucci and Versace, married to a famous rapper and earning up to six figures for a single Instagram post, to divorced, disgraced and seeing her company, Fenice Srl, make a loss of \$6.65 million last

Kardashian of Italy

"She's the Kim Kardashian of Italy," Lauren Beeching, a crisis p.r. expert who specializes in sticky situations like this, told The Post. "She's super glamorous, business-minded and commercially unstoppable. At least until

now." However, the prospect of a half-decade behind bars has not stopped the mother of two, who — rather than retreat gracefully until the trial has concluded - swanned around fashion weeks this fall, snapping pics and post-

ing with her usual diligence. Perhaps a Martha Stewart-style spell in the clink would be the best outcome

"The influencer world isn't playing by the rules, and they know they can get away with it," she told The Post.

Lindsey Halligan, the in-



Guilty plea in 'Santa' terror plot

A neo-Nazi cult leader has pleaded guilty to plotting a New Year's Eve attack in New York City using a terrorist dressed as Santa Claus dishing out poisoned candy to children.

Michail Chkhikvishvili, 22, known as "Commander Butcher," admitted soliciting hate crimes and provid-ing instructions on how to make bombs and the poison ricin as part of "monstrous plots and propaganda" leading his international Maniac Murder Cult, according to the feds.

The Georgian neo-Nazi who also inspired mass shooters with his "Hater's Handbook" — pleaded guilty in Brooklyn federal court on Monday after being hauled back to the United States from Moldova to face justice.

He "admitted his vile actions, including recruiting others to commit acts of violence against Jewish and racial minority children," said US Attorney Joseph Nocella Jr. Anthony Blair

Max sought in web cat 'kill'

A Bronx judge isn't pussyfooting around with a wannabe rapper accused of butchering a helpless house cat online in a satanic ritual.

David Mosley, 26, who goes by the alias Church of Ububal, may get a plea deal in the social-media stunt but only if he agrees to the maximum prison sentence on animal-cruelty charges, Bronx Judge Linda Poust Lopez said in court Tuesday.

Under the 2019 reforms passed by lawmakers in Albany, animal cruelty is not eligible for bail.

Cruise death twist

Federal authorities may be investigating the stepsibling of the Florida high school cheerleader whose body was found wrapped in a blanket and stuffed under a bed on a cruise ship, a new court filing revealed.

The potential federal probe comes nearly two weeks after Anna Kepner, 18, was discovered dead in her cabin on Nov. 7 during a six-day Caribbean cruise with her family aboard the Carnival Horizon.

In an emergency motion first obtained by The Daily Mail that was filed Monday in Brevard County, Kepner's stepmom, Shauntel Hudson, requested extra time to respond to filings tied to her 2024 divorce.

"Currently there is an investigation being conducted by the Federal Bureau of Investigations arising out of the sudden death of eighteen-year-old Anna Kepner," the filing states, noting that Hudson and her children were all on the cruise with the teen and her father, Christopher.

"The respondent has been advised through discussions with the FBI investigators and her attorneys, that a criminal case may be initiated against one of the minor children of this instant action," the filing continued, according to ABC News.

Mayor Adams on Tuesday unveiled sleek new designs for city sidewalk sheds so radical that pedestrians may not be able to tell they're temporary structures.

The new structures will replace Gotham's long-despised hunter green pipe-and-plywood scaffolding eyesores in a bid to enhance city street aesthetics while also boosting pedestrian safety, proponents said.

"Today marks a major step forward in our mission to reimagine New York City's streetscape," Adams said. "For too long, outdated and cumbersome sidewalk sheds have blocked sunlight, hurt small businesses, and cluttered our neighborhoods," he said.

Six new designs

The new versions of the sheds, crafted by city architecture and design firms Practice for Architecture and Urbanism, and Arup, will be used at construction projects and buildings undergoing



facade work as early as next year.

PAU's Baseline Shed involves a transparent roof angled upward from the building toward the street to let light onto the side-

The firm's lightweight Speed Shed, for short-term work including emergency repairs, has a similar angled roof with netting.

Its third design, the Wide Baseline Shed, is a heavy-duty model for wide sidewalks and major thoroughfares, and features columns spaced far apart.

Arup's models include the light-

duty, balcony-inspired Air Shed, which is completely lifted off the ground and anchored into a building for facade repair and window-replacement projects.

The firm's lightweight Flex Shed can be modified around street signs, bus stop shelters and unique building structures.

Its Rigid Shed will be used for heavy-duty repair work that involves tower cranes and high-rise construction.

The two firms were hired in February 2024 to develop the "innovative designs" and improve the current shed model, which is a frequent "source of frequent public complaints," City Hall said.

Sidewalk sheds are mandated under the city's building code and erected to protect pedestrians from falling debris at construction sites and buildings under repair, but the green blights have also posed public safety and crime concerns.

The development comes as the latest installment of the mayor's years-long Get Sheds Down Initiative, which has razed more than 400 long-standing sheds since July 2023, including some that had stood for nearly two decades.

Through a joint study last year with Mastercard, the Adams administration found that sidewalk sheds can cost Manhattan businesses \$3,900 to \$9,500 in consumer spending each month.

Registered design professionals will be able to get permits to use the new shed plans through the same permitting process employed for the old structures.

Child-sex raps for ex-mayor

A Democratic ex-New Jersey mayor and current police sergeant was arrested Monday for allegedly drugging and sexually assaulting a child he met online, officials said Tuesday.

Jersey City Police Sgt. Andrew LaBruno, 44 — who unsuccessfully ran for a state assembly seat in the Garden State's election earlier this month — went to the Engle-

wood home of a child he met online Monday and sprayed "an unknown substance into his hand" before "placing it over the victim's mouth and nose, causing the victim dizziness," according to a criminal complaint.

LaBruno, a married dad of two who is the former mayor of the Bergen County town of Dumont, then sexually assaulted the child, who was "physically helpless" from the drugging, all while the victim was home alone, the complaint alleges.

LaBruno, who ran on the Democratic ticket this year for the 39th legislative district in Bergen County, has been charged with aggravated sexual assault, sexual assault and endangering the welfare of a child.





Latinos Lost?

How Republicans can get these voters back

S President Trump losing the winning coalition he built just a year ago? He's been the subject of premature political obituaries before — but Republicans are worried about signs his gains with Hispanic voters are evaporating.

Trump stunned pundits last year by very nearly winning the Hispanic vote outright: A constituency Democrats had come to take for granted suddenly seemed ready to realign with Republicans. But the numbers from the off-year elections earlier this month tell a different story.

New Jersey townships with high proportions of Hispanic voters shifted heavily to the Democrats in the state's race for governor, according to a New York Times analysis of exit polls. "Nine of the 10 townships that shifted the most toward Democrats from 2024 to 2025 had a Hispanic population of at least 60%," the paper noted.

There's less data on Latino voters in Virginia, but the results there appear tell the same story.

If this is a backlash against immigration enforce-

ment, the GOP is in a bind: That issue is integral to the MAGA agenda and non-negotiable with the base.

Off-year elections have nothing like the massive turnout of presidential contests, and with fewer people voting, it takes fewer people to produce a big swing. Hispanics moved to the Democrats by significantly bigger margins than other constituencies, but it's possible that the most politically active Hispanics—the most likely to vote even in an off-year—are disproportionately Democratic.

Trump is known for doing exceptionally well with "low-propensity" voters of all backgrounds, who often don't turn up at all if he isn't on the ballot. But it's not only these election results that are sounding the alarm — opinion polling of Hispanic voters also shows their support for Trump plummeting.

The economic concerns weighing on all voters weigh on Hispanics as well, and as a heavily working-class demographic, they may be especially worried by the high price of beef and other staples at the supermarket.

Trump's Hispanic Slump

Latino voters' approval on several major issues declined from 2024 to 2025

A survey by the polling firm Equis, conducted before the elections this month, found Hispanic support for Trump on "cost of

living" is 40 percentage points lower now than it was in 2024, the biggest change in his approval levels

his approval levels among this group (by comparison, he's lost 24 points with them on immigration).

Nevertheless, the media spectacle of ICE rounding up Latino illegal immigrants or raiding Hispanic-owned bakeries and other small businesses adds to the strain on the winning coalition Trump built in 2024, even if Hispanic citizens also want to see stronger border enforcement and a crackdown on unlawful migration. The administration has to stand firm on immigration control without unnecessarily alienating the Hispanic voters Republican need — and who've already shown they're willing to give Trump a chance.

One way Trump can do this is by emphasizing that his exertions against illegal immigration aren't only directed at those who come from Latin America.

He also must prioritize — and publicize — the worst offenders, countering the media's tendency to promote only the most sympathetic migrants' stories.

Beyond that, the administra-

tion should reinforce its ties to American Hispanics, particularly those who own small businesses.

It's legacy-media wishful thinking when CNN's chief data analyst Harry Enten says, "Latinos hate Donald Trump" — his overperformance with them in 2024, compared to what all analysts expected, is proof of that. What Trump and other Republicans have to do is show the relationship goes both ways, with Hispanic citizens a vital component of the GOP coalition.

There's no lack of prominent Hispanic leaders in the GOP—some of them, notably Texas Sen. Ted Cruz and Secretary of State Marco Rubio, with presidential aspirations. But what came within a hair's breadth of winning a majority of Hispanics for the Republican presidential ticket last year wasn't running an ethnic candidate, but running a candidate who stood firmly for both immigration restriction and working-class opportunity—Donald Trump.

What Trump did in 2024, the GOP can do again: MAGA is more compelling to Hispanics than the halfhearted compromises Republicans served up in the past. But the GOP can't afford to be tone-deaf — and the new voters Trump has brought in will soon depart if he doesn't do his damnedest to keep them.

The Epstein Distraction

e're glad to see the House and Senate vote to release the Epstein files clearing away a ridiculous distraction. Normal Americans will wonder why this was a top order of business after 42 days of government shutdown. What the heck is going on in DC? f killing a mom and two young children isn't a horrific enough crime to warrant serious punishment in New York, what is?

A Brooklyn judge handed Miriam Yarimi just three to nine years in prison after she pleaded guilty to manslaughter for mowing down Brooklyn mom Natasha Saada and her three kids in March. Natasha, Diana, 7, and Deborah, 5, were killed, while Philip, 4, was critically injured. Brooklyn District Attorney Eric Gonzalez called it "one of the worst collisions" he's seen in his 25-year career.

His office sought a sentence of up to 15 years, which Judge Danny Chen arrogantly ignored — for zero reason: Yarimi has a history of shamelessly flouting the laws of the road, earning more than 93 traffic violations, 20 of which are speeding tickets.

She'd long been routinely contemptuous of the law and public safety. Indeed, she was driving on a suspended license and going nearly three times the speed limit when she

ran a red light on Ocean Parkway and careened into a Camry, sending her Audi flying into Natasha and her children.

After ramming through the young family, Yarimi told first responders that she was "possessed" by the devil, ranting: "I didn't kill anyone. I didn't hurt anyone. Prove it. Show me proof." This is the woman Chen thinks should be out among the unsuspecting general public within as few as three years.

No: She should pay the price for her selfish, lawless actions that cut so short the lives of a young mother and two of her children.

It's flat-out obscene that our political machines install judges like Danny Chen who go beyond New York's too-permissive statues to further encourage lawless contempt for public safety. With soft-on-crime Mayorelect Zohran Mamdani set to roll back law enforcement even more, we have to wonder how bad things will have to get before the voters finally revolt.

Minaj Takes a Stand

As Islamists slaughter in Nigeria

ICKI Minaj made her name as a raunchy rapper — but on Tuesday, the iconic superstar put do-nothing diplomats to shame when she picked up a mic at the United Nations to denounce the world's failure to defend religious liberty.

Minaj didn't invent the dirty rap song, but with tracks like "Anaconda" and "Stupid Hoe" she changed the rules for female art-

ists. She ushered in a generation of vulgar songstresses and became a liberal darling for her explicit rhymes about women's sexual equality.

Now she's backing President Trump's efforts to quell the ongoing violence against Christians in Nigeria — and his White House is releasing TikToks with her raps as the backing track.

"Religious freedom means we all can sing our faith regardless of who we are," Minaj said Tuesday, standing alongside US Ambassador Mike Waltz. "In Nigeria, Christians are being targeted, driven from their homes, and killed."

"Churches have been burned. Families have been torn apart, and entire communities live in fear, constantly, simply because of how

they pray."

Minaj, who had a son in 2020, has said her Christian faith guides her - but faith is not something Americans often hear about from their celebrity activists. Instead, these pampered scolds lecture us about oppressors and victims as they seek to create a socialist utopia on earth — and by their lights, Christians can never be victims.

That's why most of the world's humanitarian apparatus has remained silent on the con-LIBBY

tinuing attacks on Nigeria's Christians, who've been slaughtered and terrorized in huge numbers since 2009.

Islamic extremist group Boko Haram has been responsible for much of the violence, along with Fulani herdsmen who routinely target Christian farmers.

Just this week, Waltz said, 25 little girls were "ripped out of their school" by gunmen in Nigeria's northwest. And "80% of the violence against Christians worldwide" is happening in Nigeria.

Roman Catholic Bishop Wilfred Anagbe has said the directed targeting of Nigeria's Christians is "nothing short of a Jihad clothed in many names."

Yet when President Joe Biden's

administration authorized \$27 million in aid for Nigeria in 2024, he made no mention of the killings of Christians — and spoke only vaguely about the "needs of vulnerable individuals" there.

Other celebrities (ahem, Billie Eilish) complain that billionaires aren't doing enough to fix the world. They offer nothing but criticism, but Minaj is actually using her status to help.

With her influence and her 28 million followers, Minaj has brought vital attention to the continuing violence — in a voice loud enough to drown out the leftist NGOs pretending these

massacres aren't happening.

"She's one of the most followed people in the world," Waltz told Fox News. "She is reaching a whole other swath of people who may not follow these issues." And she's bold enough to brush off the backlash for aligning with Trump.

In October, when Trump posted that "Christianity is facing an existential threat in Nigeria" and denounced the ongoing atrocities, Minaj responded with public thanks. "Reading this made me feel a deep sense of gratitude," she wrote on X. "We don't have to share the same beliefs in order for us to respect each other."

Some followers lashed out: One claimed that Trump was trying to "weaponize religion so YOUR GAY FANS can be pushed into a corner and silenced." Retorted Minaj: "Imagine hearing the Christians are being MURDERED & making it about you being gay."

Hollywood celebrities have spent months on end complaining about Trump and reveling in their own hysteria. They've devoted countless hours to social-media freak-outs about a nonexistent genocide in Gaza while ignoring the very real carnage directed at

Meanwhile, the United Nations and organizations like Amnesty International and the International Crisis Group have downplayed the atrocities, claiming "complex drivers," not religious hatred, is causing unrest in Nigeria.

Few groups or nations have stood up for these Christians facing persecution for their faith— until Trump. Western nations seem to have far more interest in upholding the rights of other cultures and faiths than their own.

Minaj — an immigrant, a "proud New Yorker," a global sensation, and now a Trump ally — is not ashamed to stand for faith and freedom.

"Protecting Christians in Nigeria is not about taking sides or dividing people," she said at the UN. "It is about uniting humanity."

Those who have turned their backs on this crisis look like fools in the face of her strength.

FIGHTING THE WRONG CLIMATE WA

ESTERN politicians and climate activists are using the jungle backdrop of the poor Amazon city of Belém, Brazil for photo ops as they lecture the world on carbon emissions at the COP 30 climate summit this week.

Leaders from Europe, Australia and Canada, making ever-larger climate promises with ever-emptier rhetoric, ignore the crucial reality that Western actions are no longer central to solving climate change. It's time they recognize that real progress depends on innovation, not increasingly costly restrictions.

For decades, Western governments have made carbon cuts their mission. They've spent trillions pushing electric cars and unreliable wind and solar energy, but their pricey programs are barely making a dent. The global decarbonization rate has stayed roughly constant since the 1960s.

The 2015 Paris Agreement brought no improvement — in fact, global emissions hit a new record high in 2024. Yet climate campaigners unrealistically demand the world *quadruple* its decarbonization rate.

Why are emissions still rising, even though the EU and US spent more than \$700 billion in 2024 on green investments? Because rich-world emissions now matter less than ever before. While the West dominated carbon emissions in the past, future emissions will overwhelmingly come from China, India and other countries clambering out of poverty. One recent scenario shows that with current policies, just 13% of CO2 emissions for the rest of this century will come from OECD countries.

So the West's net-zero pledge for 2050 will cost hundreds of trillions, but deliver little. Most likely, these policies will push

energy-intensive industries to the rest of the world — as electric-carbattery manufacturing has shifted to China's coal-powered economy.

Even if the West managed to eliminate all its emissions by 2050, the impact on global temperatures would be tiny: a 0.04°F reduction by 2050 and less than 0.2°F by 2100, according to the UN.

Despite this limited relevance, protesters glue themselves to highways in Europe and the United States while largely ignoring China and disregarding India, Africa and the rest of the developing world. Small wonder: Their message of self-sacrifice holds no appeal in countries that urgently need affordable energy for development.

There is a cheaper and more promising alternative: innovation. Throughout history, humanity has overcome major challenges not by restricting growth, but by inventing better solutions. When smog choked Los Angeles in the 1950s, we created the catalytic converter. When much of the world faced hunger in the 1960s, we developed higher-yield crops.

We now need similar breakthroughs in green energy — yet innovation is precisely what the world is neglecting. In 1980, after the oil shocks, rich countries spent more

than 8 cents of every \$100 of GDP on green R&D to find energy alter-

But as fossil fuels became cheaper, that investment dropped and when climate concerns rose,

governments funneled funds into subsidizing inefficient wind and solar rather than boosting innovation. By 2023, the rich world spent less than 4 cents per \$100 of GDP — just \$27 billion, under 2% of all green spending — on research.

This must change. The West should increase green-energy R&D to around \$100 billion a year. That relatively modest investment could enable breakthroughs across a broad range of technologies: fourth-generation nuclear, scalable green hydrogen and water purification, next-generation batteries, CO2-free oil harvested from algae, carbon capture, fusion, advanced biofuels and many others.

None of these promising technologies is efficient — yet — but innovation only needs to make one or a few of them a better deal than fossil fuels. That promises a global solution, whereas Western emissions cuts barely register.

Crucially, innovation costs only a tiny fraction of what today's net-zero plans demand. Instead of pouring resources into subsidies and mandates, we could spend comparatively little to make clean energy inherently competitive. Yet the climate-obsessed politicians negotiating in Belém remain blind to the necessity of green R&D.

President Trump didn't show up at COP30, or even send a representative. Instead, his administration should lead the charge on pragmatic energy policies. His practical influence could rally others toward an affordable path that's far smarter than pouring billions into symbolic gestures.

It's time for the West to recognize its limitations — and pivot from wasteful spending to game-changing tech investments that actually deliver results.

AI hate to burst your bubble

Google boss Sundar Pichai admitted that he sees some "irrationality" driving the artificial intelligence boom and warned that "no company" would emerge unscathed if the bubble bursts.

Pichai — whose company teed up \$93 billion in capital expenditures this year alone as it boosts development of the fledgling technology
— flagged the risk to markets amid a raging debate on Wall Street about whether AI companies are overvalued.

"Given the potential of this technology, the excitement is very rational," Pichai said in a BBC interview published Tuesday.

"It's also true, when we

go through these investment cycles, there are moments we overshoot collectively as an industry."

'No immunity'

The Google CEO drew some parallels between current market conditions around AI investment and the internet boom in which valuations of early tech companies soared until the "dot-com bubble" burst in 2000.

"We can look back at the internet right now. There was clearly a lot of excess investment, but none of us would question whether the internet was profound," Pichai said. "I expect AI to be the same. So, I think it's both rational and there are elements of irrationality through a moment like this."

When asked how Google could handle the potential bursting of the AI bubble, Pichai said the company was prepared but admitted that "no company is going to be immune, including us."

Pichai also spoke glowingly about AI's potential to reshape the economy for the better — even as he acknowledged it was likely to cause labor upheaval including job losses as businesses adopt AI technology.

Tech stocks have been especially volatile during a recent downturn in US markets.

So far, Google has remained resilient, with shares surging more than 50% since the start of the

ZUCK'S COURT FAVOR Meta beats FTC

By THOMAS BARRABI

Mark Zuckerberg's Meta dodged a forced sell-off of Instagram and WhatsApp after beating the Federal Trade Commission's landmark antitrust case on Tuesday — potentially sapping the government's momentum to keep going after Big Tech.

US District Judge James Boasberg, who presided over the bench trial in Washington, DC, federal court, said the FTC failed to prove that Meta held a monopoly over social media sites built on "friends-andfamily" connections.

"The Court ultimately concludes that the agency has not carried its burden: Meta holds no monopoly in the relevant market," Boasberg wrote.

The ruling marked a major setback in a long-running campaign by regulators to rein in Big Tech. In September, Google dodged the Justice Department's request to force a sell-off of its Chrome browser despite being dinged by a federal

judge as a "monopolist." Still, Big Tech isn't out of the woods yet, according to Christine Bartholomew, an antitrust expert and professor at the University at Buffalo School of Law.

"I think it would be wrong to say tech antitrust is over," she told The Post. "But hopefully the case will serve as a strong reminder to the government to take merger analysis seriously."

The ruling affirmed it is "easier to prevent a problem at the merger stage then try to fix a resulting monopoly through postmerger antitrust enforcement," she added.

'Buy or bury'

The ruling capped a fiveyear legal saga for Meta, which was accused of utilizing a "buy or bury" strategy of acquiring upstart firms before they could threaten its empire.

Facebook bought Instagram for \$1 billion in 2012 and WhatsApp for \$18 billion in 2014.

Earlier this year, Meta argued that it actually faces intense competition from the likes of Google-owned YouTube, TikTok and other social media platforms.

Meta, which called the FTC's case "weak" in the final days of the trial, praised the judge's ruling.

"The Court's decision today recognizes that Meta faces fierce competition," a Meta spokesperson said in a statement. "Our products are beneficial for people and businesses and exemplify American innovation and economic growth."

The FTC said it would review its options in light of the ruling.

Meta shares were down about 1% in Tuesday trad-

DIY delays hurt Home Depot

Home Depot forecast a bigger drop in full-year profit after missing Wall Street estimates for quarterly earnings Tuesday, as tariffdriven economic uncertainty dampened demand for big-ticket renovations and do-it-yourself

The shift in tone from the company comes as executives said that a widely expected pick-up in demand from easing US interest and mortgage rates had failed to materialize, likely amplifying concerns over a slowing economy.

The world's top home-improvement chain set the ball rolling for a week packed with earnings reports from big-box retailers, including Walmart and Target, as investors track consumer spending ahead of the all-important holiday season amid tariff-driven cost

Home Depot's shares fell about 6% and those of rival Lowe's declined 2.4%. Lowe's is set to report results Wednesday.

"Company's margin performance remains soft due to increased operating expenses, tariffs on imported goods, rising wages, and logistics costs," said Brian Mulberry, senior client portfolio manager at Zacks Investment Management.

For the third quarter, Home Depot reported net income of \$3.6 billion, down from \$3.65 billion a



year earlier. 2.8% \$41.35 Sales rose to billion. Reuters

More Dow 'bubble' trouble The Dow Jones Industrial

Average plunged nearly 500 points, or 1.1%, Tuesday as fears over an AI bubble shook the market and traders fretted that rate cuts from the Federal Reserve aren't a sure thing.

It was the fourth straight decline for the blue-chip index and the S&P 500, which dipped 0.8%. The tech-heavy Nasdaq slid 1.2% as investors panicked over whether AI firms have been overvalued, extending a rocky tech rout into its third week.

Shares in Nvidia fell nearly 3%. The chipmaker is reporting its third-quarter results Wednesday, toward the end of an especially upbeat earnings season.

But "Magnificent 7" tech stocks have dropped amid fears that AI enthusiasm is reminiscent of the "dot-com bubble" of the 1990s and early 2000s.

Amazon, Microsoft and Meta also fell Tuesday.

"All technology revolutions create bubble-like stock price performance but this bubble is still inflating at a healthy pace with no signs of popping anytime soon," James Denmert, of Main Street Research, said in a note Tuesday.

Investors are looking ahead to the release of Fed minutes Wednesday. The September jobs report is due out Thursday.

Toyota gets revved ... to go with nearly \$1B investment in US

Toyota on Tuesday unveiled a \$912 million investment in US manufacturing, days after CEO Akio Toyoda hosted a red, white and blue NASCAR event in Japan while sporting a Trump-Vance T-shirt and red MAGA hat.

The Sunday spectacle at Toyota's Fuji Speedway featured top drivers, a crowd waving American flags and an appearance from US Ambassador to Japan George Glass, according to Automotive News.

The top Toyota exec nodded to recent US-Japan trade tensions during his bold display of pro-Trump sentiment.

"I'm not here to argue whether tariffs are good or bad. Every national leader wants to protect their own industry," Toyoda said ahead of the endurance

"We are exploring ways



to make tariffs a winner for everyone. The people we want most to be winners are our customers."

Japan is facing a roughly 15% baseline tariff on auto imports, slashed down from 27.5% as part of a trade agreement in September.

"Start your engines!" Glass' account tweeted Sunday alongside pics of him and Toyoda, who's the grandson of Toyota Motors founder Kiichiro Toyoda.

"Looking forward to celebrating the culture of [US] motorsports again next year" as part of America's 250th-anniversary festivities in Japan, he added.

Toyota, the second-largest seller of new vehicles in the US behind General Motors, said its nearly \$1 billion investment will ramp up hybrid vehicle production across the southern US.

It's part of a previously announced plan by the Japanese automaker to invest up to \$10 billion in the US by 2030, a project President Trump revealed last month. Most of the investments are expected to be completed by 2027.

Toyota already leads hybrid vehicle production with more than 51% market share through the third quarter of this year, according to Motor Intelligence data. But the company is looking to further increase manufacturing of hybrid-compatible engines and vehicles at certain American facilities.

The single largest piece will be \$453 million toward Toyota's Buffalo, W.Va., plant.

Panera Bread is readying a multimillion-dollar turnaround strategy, and its chief executive wants less iceberg lettuce in the mix.

The St. Louis-based chain known for its sandwiches and salads is overhauling its menu, operations and decor as part of an effort to reverse years of stagnant sales growth. Among the changes: Many salads will again feature romaine lettuce, after Panera last year

swapped in lower-cost iceberg greens in some of its mixes.

"No one likes iceberg," said Paul Carbone, CEO of Panera Brands, parent company to Panera Bread, Einstein Bros. Brands and Caribou Coffee. The company said that it aimed to boost annual sales to \$7 billion by 2028, from around \$6 billion.

"The guest doesn't dislike us, they just have forgotten about us," Car-Dow Jones bone said.

Gold losing its \$hine

Gold prices Tuesday plunged to their lowest levels in more than a week on diminishing hopes for an interest-rate cut at the Fed's December meeting.

Gold futures dropped 0.2% to \$4,061.30 per ounce — the fourth straight day of declines. Gold hit its lowest price since Nov. 10 earlier in the session.

Kering's Gucci factor

Kering's return to growth will require reducing its reliance on struggling flagship Gucci, further scaling back its store network and chasing more synergies, Chief Executive Luca de Meo said in a memo.

"We remain humble," de Meo wrote, saying that his ambition was to "become the undisputed challenger in luxury" in five to 10 years.

Long seen as a threat to its larger French rival LVMH, Kering has been grappling with a doubledigit sales decline at its flagship label Gucci while piling up debt through acquisitions.

In the memo, De Meo sets an 18-month timeline to get all brands back on the growth track, while saying that restoring a "top financial performance" will take three years.

It also must cut back on an "overdependency" on Gucci by developing its Saint Laurent, Bottega Veneta and Balenciaga brands.

BeatBox, **InBev talks**

Bud Light parent Anheuser-Busch InBev is in talks to buy BeatBox, a maker of fruity and highly alcoholic punch and tea drinks, The Wall Street Journal reported Tuesday

The deal would value BeatBox at around \$700 million and could come together soon, sources said.

Austin, Texas-based Beat-Box, known for its brightly colored Tetra Pak boxes with screw caps, was founded in 2011 and has gained traction with younger drinkers.

Days after her name appeared in a tranche of newly released Jeffrey Epstein emails, Goldman Sachs General Counsel Kathy Ruemmler sent a company-wide message that some employees found tone-deaf.

She wrote that "what and how you communicate reflects on you and the reputation of the firm" in a Tuesday memo reminding staffers to complete mandatory training including a module on "communications at Goldman Sachs."

The message was not well-received by employees who are disturbed that the firm has yet to even acknowledge that its top legal officer had questionable judgment when it came to advising Epstein.

<u>'Under the rug'</u>

"The fact they'd put her name on this after last week's emails . . . it's beyond offensive," one insider said.

Sources also said a handful of employees have left Ruemmler's team over the last few months, frustrated over perceptions that the ongoing scandal has seemingly been swept under the rug. A September report in The Wall Street Journal claimed she was close to Epstein and once even named the executor of his estate.

And a 2023 WSJ story said that Ruemmler "had dozens of meetings with Epstein in the years after her White House service and before she became a top lawyer at Goldman Sachs ... [Epstein] also planned for her to join a 2015 trip to Paris and a 2017 visit to Epstein's private island in the Caribbean."

Emails reveal Ruemmler, a former Obama White House attorney who also referred to herself as Epstein's lawyer in one email, had a friendly relationship with the disgraced financier.

She wrote to Epstein on Sept. 19, 2014: "I'll be here all week . . . you may get sick of me . . . "

After Ruemmler messaged Epstein "Most girls do not have to worry about this crap," he replied: "Girls?,, careful I will renew an old habit." Their banter contin-



Ep-tied lawyer's memo riles bank's staffers

In July 2016, Epstein wrote, "pretty black dress, you and ruth ginsburg." Ruemmler replied, "I like that dress ... narciso Rodriguez. Where did you see that picture? RBG was my date to state dinner."

Also in 2016, Epstein wrote, "do you think Bill Clinton would like to join you me chud and steve? could

be very funny, all off the record." She replied, "While he might like to, his lawyer would advise him against it.:-)."

The emails predate Ruemmler's time at Goldman Sachs, said bank spokesman Tony Fratto.

"Kathy is an excellent general counsel who always serves the firm with integrity ... there is no change

in attrition in that office for any rea-

"As Kathy has repeatedly said, she regrets ever having met Jeffrey Epstein," Fratto told The Post.

Some Goldman staffers were quick to note that others tied to Epstein have publicly had their hands slapped.

Former Treasury Secretary Larry Summers, who was revealed to have exchanged emails and texts with Epstein well after his 2008 guilty plea for sex crimes and up until Epstein's July 2019 arrest on federal child sex trafficking charges, said Monday he is "stepping back from public commitments."

The Indiana Pacers did more than just crush the dreams of Knicks fans last year. They also came within a whisker of winning a championship, losing in Game 7 of the NBA Finals.

That feels like an eternity ago. Not only is Tyrese Haliburton likely out for the season, but other injuries have mounted. Indiana owns the league's worst record at 1-13 overall and just 5-9 against the spread (ATS), which is surprising because Rick Carlisle is widely regarded as an elite coach.

The Pacers host the Charlotte Hornets on Wednesday as one-point favorites with a total of 237.

Eventually Indiana will string together some wins, especially with Bennedict Mathurin recently returning from injury, but I do not think it starts against Charlotte. The Hornets are 4-10 but injuries to stars LaMelo Ball and Brandon Miller have disrupted a season that began with promise.

However, lottery pick Kon Knueppel has delivered right out of the gates. The rookie out of Duke is averaging 17.6 ppg on 46.5 percent shooting to go along with six rebounds. He has fit it in perfectly alongside the ball-dominant Ball.

Ball recently returned, so I firmly believe this version of Charlotte, which is still without Miller, is better than the Pacers with Mathurin and T.J. McConnell returning from injury. They will certainly help, but there is only so much they can do for an offense that ranks dead last in efficiency.

Both teams struggle defensively, ranking in the bottom 10 of efficiency, but I feel the Hornets with Ball, Knueppel and Miles Bridges will have a much easier time generating points.

I have a 77-63-2 ATS record in this Post sports section, pending a Tuesday night play. My next pick is the Hornets +1 at the Pacers on Wednesday.

In Los Angeles, LeBron James had 11 points and 12 assists in the first game of his unprecedented 23rd NBA season, and **Luka Doncic** had 37 points and 10 assists in the Lakers' 140-125 victory over the Jazz on Tuesday night.

100/1 on USC title may not last long

Just when it felt as if the College Football Playoff picture was starting to get settled, it got blown up.

At this time last week, Alabama seemingly was a safe bet to make the dance, but a loss to Oklahoma in Tuscaloosa has put the Crimson Tide under some pressure. They've got Eastern Illinois on deck this week, but a must-win Iron Bowl awaits the Tide in Week 14.

Oklahoma's win vaulted its prospects of making the Playoff from long shot to coin-flip territory, which is bad news for the likes of Notre Dame, Utah, BYU, Miami, Vanderbilt and Georgia Tech.

Adding even more confusion to all of this is the fact that there are 19 Power 4 teams still mathematically alive to win their respective conference.

The only conference that seems straightforward is the Big Ten, where Ohio State seems to be on a collision course with Indiana. But that game will almost certainly be largely ceremonial, as the loser of the Big Ten Championship will almost certainly get an at-large

Ohio State and Indiana are two of four teams, along with Texas A&M and Georgia, that boast a 99 percent chance of going to the College Football Playoff, per ESPN's model.

Two other teams, Texas Tech and Ole Miss, are essentially locks at 91 and 89 percent, respectively.

The bubble teams (ex-

cept for BYU and Utah)

will be rooting like crazy for Texas Tech to win the Big 12 Championship, because a win over West Virginia in Week 14 would lock up an atlarge bid for the Red Raiders, even if they were to fall in the title game.

One of the so-called bubble teams, Notre Dame, is going to be hard to leave out of the picture if it takes care of business against Syracuse and Stanford. Notre Dame is -2500 at DraftKings to make the CFP, and the fourth favorite to win the national champion-

When you sort through all of this, the likeliest scenario is that there are three at-large bids up for grabs and over a dozen teams with their sights set on them.

And it may be wiser to assume it's just two spots. Alabama is going to be a big favorite over Auburn in the Iron Bowl, and while the Tigers are dangerous, the Tide have been on a completely different level compared to their in-state rival this season.

That leaves two spots among many worthy candidates, including a 100/1 shot that has a real path to the playoff, and more importantly, the upside to make a run if it gets in.

USC may be the most underrated unit in the country. According to SP+, the Trojans grade out as the 13th-best team in FBS, powered by the sixth-best attack. The defense lags behind, but it's

still a top 40 unit by most metrics, and that's good enough to play a supporting role behind Jayden Maiava and the high-flying offense.

For USC, the calculus is pretty simple. If the Trojans beat Oregon on the road on Saturday, they will likely get into the playoff at Oregon's ex-

pense. A win over UCLA in Week 14 will also be required, but the Trojans should have no issues there.

An early loss to Illinois seemed to cast the Trojans as outsiders, but the Illini are

no shrinking violets, and USC's only other defeat came on the road against Notre Dame. Wins over Iowa, Nebraska, Michigan, and hypothetically, Oregon, would be enough to not only get the Trojans an invite but also prove that they're one of the in the sport.

best outfits in the sport. USC is +400 at DraftKings to make the Playoff, which is fine value, but the 100/1 at FanDuel to win the national championship is an eye-popper.

That number will tank if the Trojans stun the Ducks on Saturday.

Bradley in running to lead Red Bulls

It was only 10 days ago Michael Bradley coached MLS Next Pro side New York Red Bulls II to a championship after taking the helm of the Red Bulls development team in the middle of the season.

Soon enough, Bradley, a U.S. Men's National Team great, could be taking charge of the first team.

One of the first tasks Julian de Guzman — the newly installed Red Bulls head of sport — must ad-

dress is finding a new head coach, and Bradley is among the candidates being considered, he told The Athletic on Tuesday.

"Absolutely, he deserves to be," de Guzman told the outlet, indicating Bradley was in the mix for the job. "He is somebody who has a very bright future as a wonderful coach in the long run. He's definitely somebody we're looking at."

The Red Bulls parted ways with head coach Sandro Schwarz following the season after the club failed to make the playoffs for the first time since 2009.

The decision came a year after Schwarz led the Red Bulls to an MLS Cup Final appearance against the LA Galaxy.

De Guzman told The Athletic that it wasn't just that Bradlev helped coach the second team to an MLS Next Pro Cup title that caught the head of sport's attention.

"I'm very impressed by what he's done. ... Beyond winning MLS Next Pro itself, it's his [playing] style,"

de Guzman told the outlet. "It's attractive for players, for fans. You can see how calm he is, how he delivers his message to the players. I must say it's refreshing."

Bradley was hired by the Red Bulls in June, and it marked the first head coaching position he's held.

Warriors assistant coach DeMarco Chris emerged as a serious contender for the Liberty head coaching job, multiple sources told The Post on Tuesday.

He joins a pool of finalists that includes former Nets assistant Weaver, Raptors assistant Jama Mahlalela and Mercury associate head coach Kristi Toliver.

DeMarco, 40, is a fourtime NBA champion assistant coach and has more than a decade of coaching experience at the NBA and international levels.

He's spent the past 14 years with the Warriors, working his way up from video coordinator to his current role as an assistant on Steve Kerr's staff.

He runs the Warriors defense, which is currently ranked in the top seven in the league.

In 2019, DeMarco was appointed head coach of the Bahamian men's national team.

Under DeMarco's guidance, the Bahamian men's team, featuring Buddy Hield, Eric Gordon and Deandre Ayton, won the 2023 Olympic Pre-Qualifiers in South America. De-Marco also had them one win away from earning a spot in the Paris 2024 Games, a massive accomplishment for a low-resource program that has yet to compete on the Olympic stage in its his-

DeMarco is billed as more of a defensiveminded and player-development coach, but he's experienced with modern offensive styles that prioritize space, player movement and favors skill versatility. He's spent years studying how opponents guard Stephen Curry.

DeMarco has also worked closely with dozens of players, including Klay Thompson and Jordan Poole, and was credited with helping Poole have his breakout season during the team's 2022 title run. His championship pedigree, paired with his ex-

erty's next head coach. perience seeing the integration of stars, including Kevin Durant, Chris Paul and Jimmy Butler, into a team could serve him well in a job like the Liberty, who are loaded with talent.

The Liberty's search for Sandy Brondello's replacement has entered its eighth week. It's the league's only remaining opening.

The process has included a vast pool of candidates who've gone through multiple rounds of interviews and exercises.

New WNBA CBA proposal could see \$1.1M deals

The WNBA's latest collective bargaining proposal would include revenue sharing with a maximum salary of more than \$1.1 million available to more than one player per team growing each year, according to a person familiar with the negotiations on Tuesday night. WNBA officials updated

the board on the latest proposal at meetings this week, the person told The Associated Press on condition of anonymity because ongoing

negotiations are private. The new league minimum would be more than \$220,000 with an average of more than \$460,000.

Those numbers would start in the first year of the deal for more than 180 players and increase over the length of the CBA.

People familiar with the WNBA's latest proposal described the plan to the AP as a highly lucrative package providing substantial increases over prior years and designed to bring negotiations to a quick conclusion.

The current CBA was set to expire Oct. 31 when the WNBA and the players union agreed to continue negotiations to Nov. 30, allowing more time to negotiate a deal that would be revolutionary for the players in terms of salary.

The players exercised their right to opt out of the current CBA last year with hopes of getting, among other things, increased revenue sharing, higher salaries, improved benefits and a softer salary cap.

WNBA Commissioner Cathy Engelbert was hopeful before the 2025 All-Star Game that everyone would be talking about how great the next CBA would be at the 2026 All-Star Game.

"I'm still really optimistic that we'll get something done that would be transformational," she said in

Michael Porter Jr. entered Tuesday having come off back-to-back season highs in assists, with seven apiece in a loss at Orlando and a win in Washington.

Boozer one of three worthy prospects at top of draft who could change Nets

While the tanking Nets were losing to the visiting Celtics, one of the prospects they're tanking for was putting on a show on the other side of the East River.

Cameron Boozer showed the limelight of the Garden wasn't too bright for him, leading Duke to a 78-66 win over Kansas in the Champions Classic. And while he didn't face injured Darryn Peterson — one of his two main rivals to be drafted first overall - Boozer showed more than enough Tuesday to impress the entire NBA.

There were 67 reps from 23 of the league's 30 teams watching Boozer, the son of former NBA All-Star Carlos Boozer. They saw the freshman forward shake off a slow start to finish with 18 points, 10 rebounds and five assists, a plus-10 in the most comfortable he's been in college.

"Yeah, for sure. Obviously I've had to get used to playing college basketball because last year I was in high school. This is a com-

pletely different game. It's faster. It's obviously more physical," said Boozer, just 18. "Obviously it was a big matchup. But I like to rise to the occasion, so I felt like I was very comfortable."

The thing is, he can get far more comfortable, far more dominant.

That's what excites Duke, and what would excite the Nets about landing him.

The Nets are tanking hard — tied for the league's third-worst record at 2-12 - because they desperately need a young star unafraid of a challenge.

"Cam had 18, 10 and five. I still don't even think he played incredible; that's the thing that's really exciting," Duke coach Jon Scheyer said. "He made some key plays like the rebound in the first half, the outlet to Isaiah [Evans]. He did a great job putting pressure on the defense.

"I think there's more to be had, and that's the exciting part. I thought he did a really good job. This place is different, playing at MSG. It's different. He did a really good job handling

Boozer didn't wow with athleticism or explosiveness, but he impressed with his IQ, passing and winning plays. He moved without the ball, got into good spots and used his 6-foot-9, 250-pound frame to bully when needed. And when Kansas doubled him early, he showed passing chops that scouts say could make him a half-court hub.

He showed why — along with Peterson and BYU's AJ Dybantsa — the Nets are tanking so hard.
"They'd all definitely be

the top pick [next year], every one of them," one scout told The Post.

A longtime Eastern Conference scout that spoke with The Post at the Garden said the Nets should feel good about their position.

"If you have the worst record in the NBA, you're feeling really, really, really good about yourself. You're not praying you're getting a top two [like last year]; you're just like, 'Let me get top five. Let me not drop out of the top five," ex-76ers scout Michael Vande-Garde told The Post.

Unlike this past year when Cooper Flagg was seen as the lone franchise prospect — finishing with even a top three seed would give the Nets a 40 percent shot at Boozer, Peterson or Dybantsa.

"To me Cam Boozer is super, super, super good, and I love him. ... Paolo Banchero reminds me of Boozer, and I really think he's a stud," one scout told The Post, adding he feels the 18-year-old is a future All-Star.

VandeGarde seconded the Banchero comparison.

"That's what I see in him. He's got a lot of skills. He's not a freakish athlete, but he's strong, he's got great positional size, can play [multiple] positions. You'd be ecstatic," VandeGarde

Scott. But it often takes time. The Johnnies didn't hit their stride until January a year ago. Rick Pitino's team is looking to win that way again — Zuby Ejiofor is the Red Storm's lone returning starter and like Kentucky it is very much a work in progress.



Sullivan, Blueshirts 'really excited' about youngster Morrow

LAS VEGAS — The recalling of Scott Morrow by the Rangers amid uncertainty surrounding Will Borgen's status provided some insight into the team's approach to configuring the defense.

As the Rangers prepared to face the Golden Knights at T-Mobile Arena, Borgen, who missed the previous two games with an upper-body injury, was a game-time decision once again Tuesday night. Borgen ultimately dressed and lined up alongside Carson Soucy, while Matthew Robertson slotted next to Braden Schneider on the third pair.

After making his season debut Sunday against the Red Wings, Morrow, 23, was scratched Tuesday amid Borgen's return.

"We've been really excited about Scotty's game," head coach Mike Sullivan said after the morning skate on Tuesday. "I think he's a good, solid two-way defenseman. I think he's a good puck mover, in particular. Given the fact that we have a right-handed shot that was questionable [Borgen], both [assistant coach David Quinn] and I prefer to have defensemen on their strong side, for a lot of reasons. We could talk for three days on it. The other aspect of it is some of our lefties just aren't comfortable playing the offside ... it's very different. We didn't want to put any of the players in difficult circumstances. So that was part of the decision for Scotty to get called up.

"We're also excited about his game and potentially where it could go. He's a really good puck mover. We think he has decent instincts offensively. He can help us with a transition game. He's pretty good along the offensive blue line. He has good size. I think, positionally, there's an opportunity for growth there and I think we've got a chance to help

him. Physically, I think he's capable of playing at this level. He's hockey strong, and he has good size.

"Those are all the things that attracted us to him in the first place. We think potentially he has the ability to be an impact player at this level at some point in time. When that happens, I think it depends on him and it depends on the situation. He'll get an opportunity to play and has got an opportunity to play. We'll see where it goes.'

Before he made his Rangers debut on Sunday, Morrow's last NHL appearance came with the Hurricanes in last season's Eastern Conference final against the eventual Stanley Cup champions, the Panthers.

Sunday counted as Morrow's 17th regular-season contest of his NHL career. He logged just 9:56 of ice time in the 2-1 loss, which was largely due to the Rangers' surplus of shorthanded ice time in the third period.



Roy blasts hit on defenseman

DALLAS — The Islanders were left shaken by Mikko Rantanen's hit on Alexander Romanov that appeared to cause the defenseman serious injury with 27.3 seconds to go in their 3-2 win over the Stars on Tuesday night, and Patrick Roy blasted the Finn for a move he saw as "disrespectful to our guys."

With Romanov's numbers facing him and both players going full steam toward the end boards, Rantanen pushed Romanov hard into the glass. Romanov, whose head appeared to hit the boards first, went down in a heap and needed help off the ice. An Islanders spokesman said Romanov did not need to be taken offsite for treatment, but otherwise there was no further update on his status.

Rantanen was assessed a five-minute boarding major and a 10-minute game misconduct. As he went down the tunnel, Roy exchanged words with him.

"I hope he's gonna be OK at this moment," Roy said. "I don't know exactly what it is. All I'm gonna say is, when you see the number, you have to lay off. Everybody knows that. You don't go through the guy.
"And I'm proud [of] the

way that our guys handled it afterwards. No one was happy to see someone get hurt like this. To me, it's disrespectful to our guys."

Stars coach Glen Gulutzan spoke in defense of Rantanen, saying his skates were clipped by Scott Mayfield, causing him to come into Romanov off-balance.

"I've seen Rants play enough over the last 10 years that it's just one of

those hockey plays that happens," Gulutzan said. "I hope Romanov is OK."

Roy, who was coaching the Avalanche when Rantanen was drafted there, did say that such a play was unlike him.

"That's not his style. At the same time, that should not be a part of our game," Roy said. "That should not be a part of our game."

Despite a gutty win that snapped a five-game Stars winning streak and brought the Islanders to 5-1-0 through six games of this road trip, the mood in the dressing room had a somber tone.

"You put yourself in my shoes. Whenever your friend gets hurt on the ice, it's way more important than hockey me," Jean-Ga-briel Pageau said. "And obviously, we get two points, we're happy about that. Everyone, I think, our first concern was Rommy."

Simon Holmstrom was out with illness, and Maxim Tsyplakov drew into the lineup in his place.

DALLAS — If not for what looked like a serious injury to Alexander Romanov in the final minute of Tuesday's game, you would call this the best road trip the Islanders have had in a hot min-

"That's scary stuff," Anders Lee said. "Game's fast, game's heavy. It happens sometimes. You just hate to see it. Doesn't matter when. Just hoping he's doing all right right now.'

Aside from making clear that Romanov did not need to go to the hospital, there was no update on his status from the Islanders.

And after things calmed down from

So too in their response to Robertson's 1-1 goal, which came on a three-on-one rush that followed a Tony DeAngelo turnover a few minutes later.

By the third period, when the game's decisive notes were played, they were in the dogfight fully — and there would have been no winning this otherwise.

Just 3:12 into the final period, Horvat got the greasy goal the Islanders needed, cleaning up the garbage on Kyle Palmieri's rebound.

Horvat appeared to give the Stars a window back into the game when he caught Oskar Bäck with a high stick a few minutes later, and earned a 10-minute misconduct along with the double minor penalty. But instead, the Stars imploded.

Palmieri made it 3-1 on a shorthanded rush on what was the leagueleading fifth short-handed Islanders goal of the season. Jamie Benn wiped out two of the four minutes with a high stick of his own, and the Islanders dutifully killed off the rest of the penalty.

"I feel our guys are playing solid hockey right now," Roy said. "... I thought it was a hard-fought game. We played well enough to win.

Robertson scored to pull the Stars within one with 1:59 to go. Had he been in just a slightly different position 1:58.59 later, the night may have ended very differently indeed.

It is tiresome to look forward to another draft, and ultimately to another allegedly hopeful season that will take place in a year other than the one we're presently living in. Football is no longer a season in New York but a yearly reminder than in other cities, other teams really do play important games after Columbus

Are we used to it? Sure we are. Are we inured to it? That's when Woody Johnson and John Mara and Steve Tisch really need to start worrying. Because that's when the anger morphs to apathy, when the fans become agnostic about the secular part of their Sundays. Most aren't quite there yet. But it keeps getting harder. And here's the thing:

It keeps getting worse.

The Giants still have home games against the Commanders, Cowboys and quickly fading Vikings. The Jets have home games against the Falcons and Dolphins and a road game at New Orleans.

Can they win half those six games? That would get them to seven, and they'd be spared losing more games than their ancestors of 1973 and '76 (who played three fewer games apiece). But it would leave them with 27 losses, and that would be a record, and not the kind for

Carter was getting treatment

Abdul Carter was receiving treatment in the red light therapy bed at the Giants facility Friday morning when his team was on the field, The Post has learned. Missing that 15-minute walkthrough was the reason interim head coach Mike Kafka decided to discipline Carter by not starting him in Sunday's 27-20 loss.
Initial reports that Carter

missed the walk-through because he was sleeping are inaccurate.

Kafka, since taking over for fired Brian Daboll, made some nuanced changes to the practice schedule, and one of those changes was the quick walkthrough for Friday morning. Players were alerted of this alteration at a team meeting and Carter evidently did not hear that announcement. So, he thought he had time to use the red light therapy bed in the recovery room. Players use that low-level red light therapy to help with pain relief and reduce inflammation.

The recovery room is not located in the trainers room. It is also not in a highly trafficked area, meaning it is certainly possible no teammate or member of the training staff was around to alert Carter that there was a walkthrough at the time he was in the therapy bed. These are factors in how Carter missed the walkthrough and not excuses.

Kafka opted to keep Carter off the field for the first series on defense — six plays. After the game, Kafka admitted this was "the coach's decision." Asked if he wanted to make an example of Carter, Kafka added, "he played his butt off. He practiced his tail off, played his butt off. I'm really happy about Abdul and excited to watch him continue to grow and continue to play a lot more as a pro."

There are conflicting accounts from The Post's sources regarding whether Carter has had issues with repeated lateness this

Carter on Tuesday told ESPN's Adam Schefter that "my mistake was an honest mistake. I own the fact that it was an honest mistake. I was getting treatment and I told coach Kafka that, too. But to say I was sleeping at that time just wasn't true. And it also wasn't a trend. This was the only time it happened.

"I don't want anonymous sources to say these types of things about me that are untrue. I did make a mistake, and I own up to

what I did."

Adebo missed his fourth straight game Sunday, when he tried to return from a sprained right MCL but felt discomfort during warmups. Not putting Adebo on injured reserve turned out to be a mistake.

Showing confidence in Adebo's recovery from a broken right leg last season, the Giants targeted him over four other free agents who signed deals for at least \$16 million per year. If it's any consolation, D.J. Reed (Lions) and Charvarius Ward (Colts) also have missed big chunks of time.





F you're expecting Tyrod Taylor to save this Jets season from further ignominy, lower your expectations.

If you think he's any part of their murky future at quarterback, think again.

If your hope is that he'll be slinging the ball all over the field like Josh Allen when he starts in place of the benched Justin Fields against the Ravens on Sunday, look else-

One thing you can be sure of, though, is this: Taylor won't be rattled playing the surging 5-5 Ravens in Baltimore, the place where his 15year career began in 2011.

The 36-year-old journeyman, playing for his seventh NFL team, has seen it all.

He's lived through more adversity than 10 players at his position combined. How many players can say they had their lung acciden-

tally punctured by a team doctor minutes before the start of a game?

There are things Taylor figures to provide for the 2-8 Jets on Sunday - and going forward, as long as he can stay healthy — that Fields has simply been unable to do.

Firstly, he'll orchestrate at least some semblance of an actual NFL passing game, throwing the ball down the field and spreading it out to his receivers, including underutilized running back Breece Hall, something Fields inexplicably had problems doing.

Most importantly, a byproduct of

that will be the chance for Jets head coach Aaron Glenn and his offensive coordinator Tanner Engstrand to better evaluate the young receivers on the roster as they look toward 2026.

Taylor's ability to push the ball down the field will give the coaching staff a better understanding of how much a part of their future young receivers Arian Smith, Adonai Mitchell, John Metchie III, Tyler Johnson and Isaiah Williams will be.

Taylor behind center also should increase the production and accelerate the growth of rookie tight end Mason Taylor and elevate Hall to another level in the passing game.

"Tyrod's a pro-fessional," Jets Jets tight end Jeremy Ruckert said. "You know what you're gonna get from him. He's a guy who's played a lot of football.

And he's someone you can always lean on — whether he's playing or not — for advice.

"He's someone you come to on the sideline asking a question about what he saw or what he thinks as a guy with a lot of experience [and] a lot of ability."

Taylor's journey has been long and winding. He's started in 58 NFL games and has a record of 28-29-1.

The only time he's been a regular starter in the league came during his three-year stay in Buffalo, where he went 7-6 in 2015, 7-8 in 2016 and 8-6 in 2017.



Since then, he has only 16 starts in the past eight seasons, going 6-9-1. That includes his only start with the Jets this season, a 29-27 loss at Tampa against whom he was 26-of-36 passing for 197 yards, 2 TDs and one INT.

That game, though, was a look into how much more efficiency the Jets passing game is with him play-

Evaluating Fields is complicated, because he's produced such a great deal of the Jets offense with his arm and his legs.

Fields has 1,642 of the team's 2,815 offensive yards and he's produced 11 of the team's 18 offensive TDs - seven through the air and four with his legs.

But a Fields-led offense is not sustainable in today's NFL.

The Jets are averaging 139.9 yards passing per game. In case you've missed the memo on this, the NFL is a passing league.

If the Jets are to continue on this path of poor passing production to the end of the season, they'll have produced the lowest passing yards average in the NFL since the 2022 Bears averaged 130.5, according to ESPN.

The Bears went 3-14 that year and Fields started 15 of those games.

Fields ran for 1,143 yards and eight TDs that year, good for seventh in the NFL. Among the star running backs who rushed for fewer yards than Fields that year included Aaron Jones, Christian McCaffrey, Jonathan Taylor, Jamaal Williams, Ezekiel Elliott and Alvin Kamara.

That's pretty impressive stuff. For the back of your football card. Not for winning.

This is why it's time for Taylor. He's all they have, but he's a better passer than Fields.

Jets defensive tackle Harrison Phillips didn't play with Taylor in Buffalo, because he joined the Bills in 2018, the year after Taylor left. But he spoke this week about the raves he heard about Taylor when he got there.

"It was great to hear how positively they talked about him," Phillips said. "I hear some of our skill position [players] and offensive line talking about how well he's able to jell with guys. He's great at that.

"He's just been super impressive. Quarterbacks have to take the approach every week that they're gonna go play 60 snaps to win the football game or maybe never play a single snap. And, with the long career he's had there's no way he'd be able to still be doing this at a high level if he didn't take that approach every day through his 15

"We definitely feel comfortable with him going out there and leading our team."

Can Aaron grin and **Bear it?**

Not even broken bones can stop Aaron Rodgers from wanting to "own" the Chicago Bears.

The Steelers quarterback underwent further tests this week that confirmed the fracture in his non-throwing wrist will not require surgery, head coach Mike Tomlin announced Tuesday afternoon.

"Really, it's just about bracing and securing it for his comfort and safety. And then, it's about how functional he is," Tomlin told reporters.

The veteran field general is pushing to play in Sunday's road matchup against the Bears — a team he dominated for 18 years as a member of the rival Packers but "doctors must clear him and his status moving forward is TBD," says NFL insider Tom Pelissero.

Tomlin noted that Friday will be the "key day" in determining whether Rodgers will suit up in the Windy City.

"We'll see where the week leads us and we'll take it day by day," Tomlin said.

Rodgers exited the Steelers' 34-12 victory over the Cincinnati Bengals on Sunday after suffering a wrist injury in the second

Tomlin revealed Monday that the four-time MVP wanted to return to the game.

Mason Rudolph filled in for Rodgers to secure the win and would be penciled into Sunday's starting lineup if Rodgers doesn't get medically cleared to play.

The 21-year veteran has thrown for 1,969 yards, 19 touchdowns and nine interceptions through his first 10 games in Pittsburgh, a resurgent season following a turbulent two-year stretch with the Jets.

Rodgers has historically battered the Bears during his illustrious career, boasting a 24-5 record against Chicago while throwing 64 touchdowns and just 10 interceptions, all while he was with the Packers.

In 2021, he famously yelled "I own you!" to Bears fans after darting into the end zone for a rushing touchdown.

At 41, Rodgers could be looking at his last chance to play the Bears — and it would serve up quite a compelling finale.

Both the Steelers (6-4) and Bears (7-3) lead their respective divisions, with Chicago winning seven of eight games after an 0-2

Breakout outfielder returns to Yankees on qualifying offer

Trent Grisham is running it back with the Yankees, who will get to find out just how real his breakout season was.

The center fielder on Tuesday accepted the one-year, \$22.025 million qualifying offer from the Yankees, giving them some insurance heading into the offseason but also potentially crowding the outfield while tying up a large chunk

of money coming off a career year.

The return of Grisham should not impact the top Yankees priority—re-signing Cody Bellinger—as general manager Brian Cashman said recently he would continue to have conversations with Bellinger's agent, Scott Boras, even if Grisham accepted the qualifying offer. "[Grisham] had a hell of a

"[Grisham] had a hell of a year for us, one of the big reasons why we had the level of success we did," Cashman said last week. "We'd be happy if he accepted and came back."

Grisham could have opted to test the free agent market, which is especially thin in the outfield (center field in particular), one reason the Yankees may have thought he would decline it and fetch them a compensatory draft pick if he had signed elsewhere. But there was also some internal thought that he might be more inclined to take it because of the uncertainty looming in 2027 with the potential for a work stoppage.

Now, Grisham is coming back at an average annual value higher than he likely would have gotten on the market and creating some questions about how the Yankees will handle their outfield situation this offseason. If they are also able to re-sign Bellinger, that would make Jasson Domínguez and Spencer Jones potential trade chips. If Bellinger — whose suitors are expected to include the Mets, Dodgers and Phillies, among others - does not return, Domínguez could be in line to handle left field again.

perhaps with Jones getting a chance to prove himself in camp.

The 29-year-old Grisham is coming off a career year, in which he crushed 34 home runs and posted an .811 OPS across 143 games. His return provides cover in center field if Bellinger signs elsewhere — the next best option among free agents is Harrison Bader — but could also complicate things if Bellinger returns.

"If one of those guys [Grisham or Bellinger] comes back, it creates a nice competition [for Domínguez and Jones]," Cashman said. "If both come back, maybe it creates some trade flexibility."

The move does not give the Yankees flexibility with regard to their luxury tax payroll, with owner Hal Steinbrenner having previously indicated that a \$300 million payroll is not sustainable. With Grisham and lefty swingman Ryan Yarbrough (who agreed to a \$2.5 million deal on Monday) both back in the fold, the Yankees currently have a projected luxury tax payroll of roughly \$282 million, per Cot's Contracts and that is without adding Bellinger, potentially another starter and bullpen help.


If Bellinger does re-sign, the Yankees could try to find a trade partner for Grisham, but players who accept the qualifying offer cannot be traded before June 15 without their consent.

The Yankees should get some more clarity on their 2026 payroll by Friday, which is the deadline for tendering contracts to arbitration-eligible players on their 40-man roster.

▶ Jones was added to the 40-man roster Tuesday, along with right-handers Elmer Rodriguez and Chase Hampton, protecting them from next month's Rule 5 draft.

The Yankees left unprotected a handful of other fringe prospects like LHP Brock Selvidge, RHP Brendan Beck, 1B T.J. Rumfield, RHP Eric Reyzelman and RHP Harrison Cohen.



ET'S start with something we can probably all agree on, OK?
Pete Alonso is not Tom
Seaver.

If Seaver had hurt his right arm in spring training of 1977 and been forced to retire after 10 seasons, he almost surely would have taken the Sandy Koufax route to the Hall of Fame: He'd have been 182-107, with a 2.47 ERA and 2,334 strikeouts in that abbreviated version of his career. He'd still have all three Cy Youngs. He'd still be the key ingredient of the '69 Mets.

Pete Alonso has been a superb Met his first seven seasons. Maybe in his next seven seasons he'll add another 236 homers to the 264 he already has, make it to 500. No "clean" player who's gotten to 500 in a career has ever been denied entry.



But right now — today — if for some reason Alonso decides to call it a career, take up golf instead, and not take another at-bat, he'll have been a very good player, but not an immortal. We can agree on that one, right?

So if the worst-case scenario with Alonso happens in the next few weeks and he departs for a new ballclub, this would not be the *most* egregious separation in Mets history. Seaver retired that trophy. We can agree on that one, too, yes?

OK.

That said, the Mets would be foolish to let it get that far. You could argue they've been foolish to let it get this far, although once it became clear Alonso would answer his troublesome 2024 with a bounce back in '25 — .272/.347/.524, 38 homers, 126 RBI, a league-leading 41 doubles — Scott Boras wasn't going to forgo another round of romancing.

So we are here.

We are about to enter the season of hot-stove hysteria when emotions become high and reason appears in short supply. And here seems to be the message of most Mets fans to Steve Cohen and David Stearns, the men who still hold it in their power to make Alonso a lifetime Met:

We want him back. We want him to retire as a Met. We want it plain that "20" will one day hang from the roof at Citi Field. We want him to at least make a case in the argument (with David Wright) for the best Met to only play as a Met.

And those are fair points. So are these: Alonso is an imperfect player. His defense is, at best, average. He is as slow as dial-up Internet. Even this season, good as he was, he was prone to deep slumps

and long home run droughts; he had four stretches when he went more than 10 games without one, and one in mid-summer when he went homerless 22 out of 23. For a player who is a slugger, first and foremost, that's at least a conversation piece.

But the truth is, Alonso is more than a player to whom many Mets fans have an emotional attachment. Yes, that matters. Yes, he remains the most popular Met, and by a large margin, and his departure would devastate an awful lot of the faithful. Just once, Mets fans would like to follow a guy through the entirety of a career in a Mets uniform. Wright's would-be final 5-7 years vaporized due

to a bad back, he was gone early. Seaver was traded.

God bless the late Ed Kranepool, but an awful lot of Mets fans crave an 18-year Met who was also a perennial All-Star.

But it's not just that. You can't just unload a 38-HR/126-RBI player and find another. A year ago, when it seemed possible that you might essentially trade in Alonso for Vlad Guerrero Jr., especially when you could at least argue Alonso seemed in decline? You could sell that. If Stearns (with Cohen's approval) really thinks a Jeff McNeil/Mark Vientos platoon is the solution for that — especially given the year Vientos just had — he's taking the wrong kind of gummies.

Will the Mets have to pay Alonso more than they'd like, longer than they'd like? Probably. Is it fair to wonder what the 30-year-old Alonso will look like at 37? Sure it is. But it's just as fair to wonder

what 40-year-old Juan Soto will look like in 2039, too, when he'll still be a Met.

The biggest advantage the Mets have in Cohen isn't whether he'll spend money — he has — but that he can spend it with the idea that he can also outspend his mistakes, the way the Yankees have

for years. Look, the sport might look entirely different two years from now if we get that nuclear winter after the 2026 season, and by then, if there's a salary cap, maybe it'll be impossible to

behave that way.

But for now, there's no cap. For now, there's just 2026 to worry about. The Post's Jon Heyman reported not long ago that things have started off well in the negotiations. There's a long time to go. But there's really only one way for this to

end. Pete Alonso isn't

Tom Seaver, no.
But he's as close as the Mets have to an iconic franchise player right now. Maybe that shouldn't matter if you simply look at this with an ice-cold heart. But it does.

As the Mets look to revamp their starting rotation after disappointingly missing the playoffs, they're prepared to part with one of its current key cogs.

Right-hander Kodai Senga is "extremely available," ESPN's Jeff Passan reported Tuesday, adding that multiple executives anticipate the Mets trading the 32-year-old this offseason.

While Senga — who has two years left on a five-year, \$75 million contract — has impressed when healthy, injuries have held him back.

After a dazzling rookie campaign in 2023 in which he earned an All-Star nod while recording a 2.98 ERA with 202 strikeouts in 29 starts, he made just one regular-season appearance in 2024.

Senga suffered a shoulder injury in spring training that year, and when he made his season debut on July 26, he strained his calf running off the mound for a pop-up.

He was thought to be done for the season but ended up returning for Game 1 of the NLDS and made three playoff appearances, giving up seven runs across five innings.

Senga was spectacular again to begin 2025, posting a 1.47 ERA through his first 13 starts before he injured his hamstring falling on first base while catching a throw from Pete Alonso.

He came back after a month, had a 5.90 ERA over his next nine starts and was then sent down to Triple-A for the final month of the season.

Mets starting pitching was excellent to begin the season

but fell off mightily in the second half.

Sean Manaea, whom the Mets re-signed to a three-year, \$75 million contract after a strong 2024, was out until July this past year due to an oblique strain and pitched to a 5.64 ERA in $60^2/_3$ innings.

Frankie Montas, who signed a two-year, \$34 million contract before last season and will likely be out all of 2026 after Tommy John surgery, was designated for assignment on Tuesday. He was out until June this year after suffering a lat strain in spring training, then made just nine appearances (seven starts) and pitched to a 6.28 ERA in 38 ²/₃ innings before season-ending surgery.

Griffin Canning was a pleasant surprise after signing a one-year, \$4.25 million contract

with a 3.77 ERA, but he tore an Achilles tendon in June.

David Peterson earned his first All-Star nod and had a 2.83 ERA through his first 21 starts, but he fell apart down the stretch to the tune of an 8.42 ERA over his final nine appearances.

Clay Holmes was also less effective during the second half in his first full MLB season as a starter.

The rotation was in such disarray that the Mets relied heavily on prospects Nolan McLean, Jonah Tong and Brandon Sproat in September.

According to Passan, the Mets are also interested in free agent reliever Devin Williams, the formerly dominant Brewers closer who struggled with the Yankees this year.

Amazin's dump failed Montas

Another ill-fated New York tenure is over for Frankie Montas

The Mets designated Montas for assignment Tuesday, requesting waivers for his unconditional release.

Montas underwent Tommy John surgery in September, knocking him out for all of 2026, so the Mets freed up his spot on the 40-man roster, though they remain on the hook for the \$17 million left on his contract.

The 32-year-old Montas, who signed a two-year, \$34 million contract last offseason, ended up pitching in nine games (seven starts) for the Mets and posting a 6.28 ERA across 38 ²/₃ innings. It proved to be the same number of games Montas appeared in for the Yankees from

2022-2023, with injuries sabotaging his time in The Bronx as well.

Montas missed the start of 2025 with a lat strain that he suffered in spring training and then after he returned in June, was eventually demoted to the bullpen before getting injured again.

The DFA cleared a spot on the 40-man roster for the Mets to add outfield prospect Nick Morabito, protecting him from next month's Rule 5 draft. The 22-year-old speedster spent this season at Double-A Binghamton, batting .273 with 49 steals and a .734 OPS in 118 games.

➤ In a surprise to no one, **Edwin Díaz** officially declined the qualifying offer ahead of Tues-

day's deadline, passing up a oneyear, \$22.025 million deal to pursue a bigger contract on the open market.

The Mets have already begun discussions with Díaz, who is the top free agent closer after pitching to a 1.63 ERA with 28 saves this season. He said last week there is a "50-50" chance of whether he would return after opting out of the final two years and \$37 million left on his contract.

If Díaz signs elsewhere, the Mets will at least recoup a compensatory draft pick.

"We would enjoy to stay [with the Mets], but at the end of the day, we don't know what they are thinking," Díaz said last week. "We have got our role. My agency wants to do the best job, and I just listen to my agent."


